The cost of this undertaking will be in the neighborhood of \$300,000.

The C. P. R. will open their line to Parry Sound in January or February, and by this time next year the line to Sudbury will be open for traffic. Their mileage to Parry Sound is 155 miles, and the company will run trains there in four hours. About 25 stations will be opened on the line to do bustness.
