Each of the two companies would consist of about half a hundred men, and it is estimated that applications for admission to the ranks will number twice too many, as 'tis said there are about two hundred stalwart students anxious to join. 

## BRENNAN SAYS HE'S SORRY

THE MURDERER TELLS IN DETAIL THE KILLING OF STRATHY.

laims That He had Been Forcibly Ejected by the Late Banker and That He Fired

the Shot in a Moment of Excitement— Denies That He is Insane—The Coron-Barrie, Feb. 19.—(Special.)—Excitement consequent upon the awful tra-gedy of yesterday has abated but little, and the town is still discussing the details and wondering for the mo-tive of the crime. which cost John A. Strathy his life. At 9 o'clock this morning the time. morning, the time set for the inquest,

morning, the time set for the inquest, crowds of people waited in front of the Court House and lined the streets between it and the jail, anxious to get a look at the prisoner while he was being transferred to the Police Court. Prompt on time Brennan emerged from the jail, handcuffed to Detective Beardsley. He was also accompanied by Constable Marian and a World reporter, who endeavored to obtain from him the motive of the dastardly act. "Did you pass a good night?" asked the reporter. the reporter.
"No; I did not sleep much; it was a miserable night."
"What was your motive in killing
Mr. Strathy.?" The prisoner commenced to make a reply, but Detective Beardsley interrupted and warned him that he had better be careful of what he said. Brennan then exclaimed in almost a whisper: "I won't sany nothing; I can't speak now. I will tell all, though."

The Coroney's Inquest.

In the Police Court the crowd was packed so tightly that some of the spectators had their coats burned by being crowded against the stove in the centre of the room. Coroner Wall-win conducted the inquest, while the interests of the Crown were looked after by Crown Attorney Cotter. The prisoner was seated at the end of the reporters' table and wept conjustly when Jenny Neely, the Strathy servant girl, who was the only woman in court was called. The man appeared to feel his position very keenly, and the tears rolled down his face while the witnesses gave their evidence.

The witnesses examined besides Miss Neely were: Joseph Morrin, the constable to whom Brennan surrendered himself; F. M. Smith, ex-deputy sheriff, who was in the sheriff's office when Brennan came in and admitted his guilt; John Weymouth, a balliff, who heard him say he had a family of four children, which he was well able to keep if the people of the coun-
