

SEMPAGHA PASS TAKEN

An Important Victory for the British Troops in India

UNDER GENERAL SIR WILLIAM LOCKHART.

The Position of the Enemy Was Very Strong, But It Was Carried.

British Officers Were Killed and Wounded-The Advance Began Before Daybreak-Main Force, With Six Batteries, Moved Straight On the Pass - The Enemy Could Not Face the Fire of the Batteries and After About Four Hours of Fighting the Goorkhas and West Surrey Regiment Arrived at the Summit-Another Fight Took Place There, Lasting Three Hours, and the Battle Was Won.

The casualties among the British officers, already reported, are Captain DeBatts of the Artillery, who succumbed to wounds received during the engagement, and Major Handford Flood of the West Surrey Regiment, who is among the wounded. The British force will halt to-night in the Mustura Valley, and will attack Arhanga to-morrow.

According to despatches from Gundaki Sir William Lockhart explained his plan of attack to his officers last evening, and the advance from Gundaki commenced in the darkness, about 5 o'clock in the morning. The main force, with six batteries, moved straight on the pass. Detachments were sent to operate against the villages on the flanks.

When day dawned all the troops were in position at the foot of the pass. The enemy's position was very strong, and the approaches to it were grently exposed, but until now the resistance had been triffing, the tribesmen having been easily expelled from the villages of Nazens and Kundimishti.
