

THAT WRECKED STEAMSHIP.

Crew Probably Tried to Land in the Boats, But Were Evidently Drowned in the Attempt.

BODIES VISIBLE IN THE SURF.

Thought to Be a New Ship and Most Likely a Passenger Boat— Did She Take Fire?

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 12.—No further news of the steamer reported last night as wrecked on a reef in St. Mary's Bay and on fire had been received here up to daylight this morning. No steamer could leave here for the scene of the wreck before this afternoon. It was said. The colonial cruiser Flona Bay and the steamer Kite will be sent from Placentia Bay as soon as possible to try and save the survivors, if any remain. A steamer leaving here to-day could not get to St. Mary's Bay before to-morrow.

Further Particulars.
Belated reports from the magistrate and wreck commissioner at St. Mary's give the following additional particulars in regard to the steamer: "She is a two-masted vessel and is a complete wreck. Only three survivors were visible at nightfall. The vessel's boats were smashed and were floating bottom up. The crew had probably tried to land in the boats and had been drowned in the attempt. Some bodies are visible in the surf. The ship is on fire. She has some kerosene on board, but it is not thought to be a tank steamer, as it is pointed out, and she is not a passenger ship. It is feared she will break up to-day owing to the heavy sea." The magistrate also reports that she is a new ship and is probably a passenger boat. One theory is that the steamer took fire at sea, that the captain thereupon tried to make land, and that the vessel struck on the coast during a snowstorm. No one has been seen since. The lives of any of those on board the vessel will be saved. Nothing is known of her name.
