

"Attention has again been called to the fact that contagious and infectious cases are treated so contiguous to the general hospital, instead of in a separate isolated hospital under the control and management of the board of health. The number of patients admitted to this hospital during the past year was 1,897, while during the previous year, 1,710 were admitted. This increase in the number of patients admitted justifies considering very seriously the need of providing more room. The old building might be remodeled and fitted up for the reception of patients. At present its appearance is altogether out of harmony with the other portions of the building. The laundry would be much better in an isolated building. If an isolated building is erected where contagious patients can be treated in accordance with the public health act, separate and distinct from the general hospital, the wards now used for contagious cases might well be used for other purposes."
