THE TOTAL CROP OF THE WEST JAILED FOR USING THE UNION LABEL

Experts Have Estimated It at One Hundred and Ninety Millions. Must Apologize for Contempt of Injunction and Pay the Costs.

Winnipeg, Sept. 13.—A total grain crop of 1,900,000 bushels, including wheat, 800,000,000 to 850,000,000 bushels; oats, 87,500,000; barley, 18,500,000; and flax, 1,300,000, is the estimate the retiring president of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, W. J. Bettington, gave for the west at the annual meeting of the exchange yesterday afternoon.

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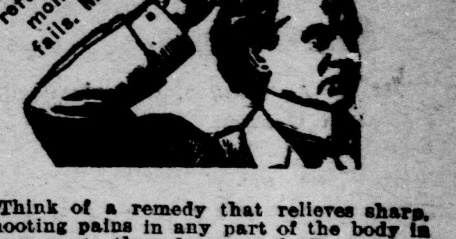
