My father went to the township of Beverly when he was 20 years old, and has resided there since that time. He voted at the last Ontario election. "Your correspondent had an interview with Mrs. Mills, of Southwold, relict of the late James Mills, on Monday, at the picturesque residence of James Mills, jun., with whom the subject of this narrative has resided continuously during the last 21 years. He was greeted warmly. This estimable lady celebrated her 110th birthday on Monday, and she is hale, vigorous and alert. During the last 21 years of her life she was slightly indisposed one day only. The only malady with which she is afflicted is rheumatism. She knows all the roads, and frequently visits the neighbors, her only assistance being a cane. Her maiden name was Mary Ann Coulter. She married James Mills, and ten children were born to them. Her husband died 32 years ago. Mrs. Mills is a native of the Emerald Isle, having quit the land of the shamrock 45 years ago last June. The good people of Southwold can boast of having the oldest person in Ontario, or, perhaps, the Dominion of Canada."

## DEATH OF MR. JOHN MILNE

A Worthy and Popular Citizen—Typhoid the Cause.

A worthy citizen joined the great majority yesterday, when death ended the sufferings of Mr. John Milne, of 36 Byron avenue. Until laid low with typhoid fever a few weeks ago, Mr. Milne, who had just reached the prime of life, his age being 41 years and 10 months, was in the best of health. But the fever claimed him, and in spite of the best nursing and medical attendance obtainable, he succumbed at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The news will be learned with deep and widespread sorrow, for he was a fine character, and he had a host of warm friends, although of a retiring disposition, he came much in contact with the public for several years past as lessee and manager of the Sulphur Springs baths and boat houses, and the market was aware of his worth but were his devoted friends.

It was while attending to his duties he was taken sick, and from the time typhoid fever began to manifest itself he has been hovering between life and death, conscious at times, and at others quite delirious. He leaves a widow mother and a sister, Mrs. W. A. Reid. Deceased was a member of King Sol-

mon's Lodge, No. 378, A. F. and A. M., West London; Eureka Lodge, No. 38, I. O. O. F.; Clan Fraser, Sons of Scotland; Court Brighton, A. O. F., and other fraternities, in all of which he was popular. Mr. Milne was a strong Liberal, but made no political statement. The widowed mother has the heartfelt sympathy of all.

Porto Rico remains orderly and all is quiet elsewhere. Major-General Brooke is installed in the palace.

Dominion inland revenue department has decided to open a bonded warehouse at Fort Francis, Que.

Phil Armour, the great Chicago pork man, is negotiating with Toronto to erect a big factory at the latter place.

Four Hamilton boys were yesterday fined \$1 each and costs for taking chestnuts from the Oakland property.

Charles Goetz has confessed to setting a house on fire at Philadelphia, alleging that he wanted to get rid of bedbugs.

The congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, have decided not to oppose Rev. W. J. McCaughan's translation to Chicago.

Three Scandinavians have arrived at Victoria, B. C., after making a 7,000-mile trip from Lake Bennett to St. Michaels in an open boat.

The twentieth annual sale of purebred poultry, cattle sheep and swine was held at the Agricultural College, Guelph, and was very successful.

In a riot in P. F. Eagan's saloon, to Chicago, Va. five regulars from Fortess Monroe were shot. One was killed. Later the soldiers fired the saloon.

A letter from St. Michaels says that the balloonists sent out to search for Andree are there. They have given up their balloon trip and stacked 25 gold claims.

Miss Blanche Beck, a school teacher, who fled to Portage county, Ohio, from Tennessee, Ill., to escape the scourge, has developed yellow fever at her place of refuge.

Countess Louisa Von Lindeau, an actress known in Germany as Countess Koenigsberg, locked up while drunk in Cleveland, made an unsuccessful attempt at suicide.

Miss Laura Williams, a popular society lady in Chicago, has sailed for London, where she is to wed Major-General Wesley Merritt, military governor of the Philippine Islands.

During the Peace Jubilee procession at Chicago there was a terrible crash, in which police, marines and spectators were all mixed up. Fortunately there was no loss of life.

Mr. Britton, Q. C., Kingston, Ont., is seeing the minister of justice about commuting the sentence on George Clute, sentenced at Brockville to seven years in penitentiary for stealing harness valued at \$2.
