DEATH'S HARVEST

Demise of the Noted Cuban Leader.

Gen. Garcia—Sir William Anderson

and Sir Thomas Uppington Pass

Away.

Thomasville, Ga., Dec. 12.—In the

midst of laughter and flowers, the wife

and two daughters of Gen. Garcia,

Misses Mercedes and Marcia, received

the tidings of their father's death. The

blow was terrible in its suddenness,

and has prostrated the entire family.

The noon train brought the Garcias

from Washington and the news of the

decease of the hero of Cuba, Gen. Garcia,

Major Stern, and they were installed

in the handsomest suite at the Masur

Hotel. A telegram on Sunday morning

came from Capt. Julio Garcia, in Wash-

ington, informing his mother that the

condition of the general was much im-

proved, and the family went to the

dining-room with light hearts. Their

table was gaily decorated with roses,

violet and ferns in honor of the occa-

sion, and all three ladies were paid the

compliments usually accorded to people of

distinction. In the midst of this happy

scene came the shocking news from

Washington. The plans of Mrs. Garcia

are not known.

General Callito Garcia, the Cuban

leader and head of the commission

elected by the Cuban people to

represent the island at the peace confer-

ence after 10 o'clock. The sudden change

from the warm climate of Cuba, with

the hardships he had there endured,

to the wintry weather of New York

and Washington, but failed to prevent

the pneumonia which resulted in his

demise. He had experienced an active and

varied life, much of which had been

spent in fighting for the cause of Cuban

liberty. He was a man of culture

and refinement, of splendid education,

and came from a distinguished family

of Jacaguani, Santiago de Cuba pro-

vince, and was 59 years old. He was

the original conspirator in the uprising

of the Cubans against Spain in 1895,

and in the war under Gomez he at-

tained the rank of brigadier-general,

and during his career won many notable

victories. In 1875, while reconnoitering

with his escort, he was surrounded by

2,000 Spaniards. Preferring death to

capture and subsequent execution, he

threw himself into the arms of his

enemies, and was killed. He was

buried in the city of Havana, and

his remains were later transferred to

the city of Santiago de Cuba.

His death is a great loss to the

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
