CANADA'S CHEESE TRADE IN 1907

The Dominion Exports Fell Off, But the Prices Were Higher.

Ottawa, Jan. 12.—Statistics of the cheese trade of the country recently compiled show that the make of cheese and butter of Canada was not only far below last year, but considerably short of the average of the past few seasons. The aggregate value of Canadian cheese and butter exports for the season 1907 was \$20,136,398, and the return to the dairy farmer from the season's exports to the close of navigation were \$5,812,636 less than the amount received last year. This decline was, of course, principally in the butter exports, and the entire decrease in returns from exports was more than fully made up by the higher prices ruling in the domestic markets. According to the Montreal Gazette's Annual, the Canadian farmer, allowing for the cheese still to be exported, receives \$23,000,000 for the 1907 dairy operations, as against \$25,000,000 in 1906. The small make of cheese is attributed by the Gazette to the fact that the season throughout the whole of eastern Ontario was abnormally backward. The longshoremen's and teamsters' strike at Montreal at the opening of navigation delayed the export movement and resulted in high prices at the outset. It was not until the beginning of June that the first grass cheese was offered. Later on the absence of men again interfered with the make. The receipts at Montreal from May 1 to the close of navigation were 2,045,152 boxes, as compared with 2,334,569 boxes for the corresponding period last year, leaving a shortage for the season in Montreal alone of 289,417 boxes. There was a steady demand throughout the season, and high prices prevailed, resulting in good returns to farmers. In the London market the ruling average price during the seven months of production was 61s, as against 59s 6d for 1906, so that cheese in London this year sold on the average 1s 6d higher than it did last season.

LAYMEN'S MOVEMENT

was work that only could be done by men. The attendance was most gratifying. There was not an empty seat in the hall, and many stood up until the programme was finished. They were all enthusiastic in the cause, and were deeply impressed with the needs of the church of today. The luncheon itself was a good one. The programme was conducted in good style, and was run off in schedule time, or near it.

During the evening Mr. Cyril Dwight-Edwards sang three solos in masterly fashion. Mr. Edwards was in splendid voice, and exerted great enthusiasm among the audience. It has been seldom that Mr. Dwight-Edwards has been heard to better advantage.

Mr. J. Wilson also sang a solo in good voice. Mr. C. E. Wheeler acted as accompanist in his own good style. Rev. Dr. Ross, pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, presided, and introduced the toast list.

Some of Those Present.

At the principal table were: Chairman Dr. Ross, Mr. J. A. MacDonald, W. T. Ellis, James Stewart, Rev. J. C. Stuart, Rev. Walter Moffat, Ald. Armstrong, Rev. Mr. Mitchell, Sheriff Cameron, Rev. Dr. Munroe and Rev. Thos. H. Mitchell.

Rev. Walter Moffat said the blessing. The toast to the "Men in the Movement" was proposed by Prof. W. J. Patterson, of the Western University.

Dr. Merchant replied in a thoughtful address, in which he dwelt on the needs of men in the church of today. Mayor Stevely was given a tremendous reception when he arose to introduce the toast to "The Church and the City."

Mr. John Macpherson, in responding, showed the relation between the church's growth and the city's progress, and the dependency of each upon the other.

The Laymen's Movement.

The toast, "The Laymen's Missionary Movement," was introduced by Mr. C. R. Somerville. He spoke of the laymen's movement as enlarging the church's vision. The church has been satisfied to let the world outside take its chances. The members of the church were liberal for its own needs, and were practically forgetful of any need further than that. They forgot that the church was by mission, and that it would not and could not live unless it enlarged its borders. Christ himself brought the tidings to all the world 2,000 years ago, and his last message was to his disciples to go and preach the word to all nations. The church had done many great things in the past, but had not done work to the extent necessary. For this purpose the laymen's movement had been organized during the past year. It was trying to get the men of the world to take part in the work of the church. The idea was to evangelize the world in this generation. The speaker had great pleasure in introducing Mr. W. T. Ellis to the meeting. Mr. Ellis had done great things for the missionary movement, and it was a great pleasure to have him present.

Mr. Ellis' Address.

Mr. Ellis was given a splendid reception. He declared amid laughter that he had come from many places, but not from New York. He referred to his pleasure at being present at the banquet in spite of the fact that a post office strike had been in effect without its terms, there were fastenings, and no banquet without a lot of speeches.

He spoke of the great laymen's movement in the United States. It was not composed of nicely groomed, cleanly-shaven, finely-dressed ladies, like fellows. It used to be said that the men in the churches all possessed ladylike virtues, and one writer referred to one member as being a "perfect lady." That sort of man was not in this movement. It did not find its affinity there. The strong, forceful, brainy leading men of America were rising up to a new conviction, almost a new piety, among the men of the church. There were many signs to be read by the casual observer that men who had never gone into any new movement, were now deeply interested in America's international religious obligations.

World One Neighborhood.

Joseph Cooke once said that the nineteenth century made the world one neighborhood, and it would be the duty of the twentieth century to make it one brotherhood. If on the other hand there was neighborhood without brotherhood, it would be a curse, not a blessing. If that was not believed all one had to do was read the dispatches from Vancouver, and be convinced. The time would soon come when the nations of the earth would be at each other's throats, unless there was one conception of human destiny in the Orient and Occident. The speaker was convinced that the world was becoming one brotherhood. At a newspaper man he had to earn his livelihood by keeping his finger on the pulse of the world. He had been sent out to the east for a syndicate of papers as free as sunlight to render his own best judgment on what he saw, and he had come to the final and searching conviction that there was something doing in the world today.

Movement in Canada.

The movement in America was not different from the strange stirring in the Orient. There is a relation between what is doing here and what is going on there.

"In Canada, there has been something doing," declared the speaker, "I found that out as soon as I had crossed the border. If you will permit me, to digress a little, that boundary should never have existed. It is artificial. We do not cover your lands, we cover you. The same is true here that is in America—sometimes better here than there. In Japan, I have heard it said that if war came between Japan and America, Japan would have an ally just across the border from America. That would indeed be a sorry day if it should ever come. We have nothing in common with Japan, but we have everything in common with Canada."

In the United States we have a religious and commercial revival, and one cause of it all is Evangelist Roosevelt, who believes that his position is

a pulp, from which he may preach to the nation.

"There is something doing in Great Britain. You may call it laborism, or socialism or liberalism, or whatever name you like. There is that surging, vague unrest among the people."

In Europe.

Mr. Ellis named European countries where there was a great unrest. Germany was restless. There was great ferment in Morocco, where a holy war had been proclaimed. Portugal was in the throes of mighty changes. Spain, sitting amid the ashes of her shame, knows not of the movements going on within her borders, but they are known here. Italy is shot through and through with unrest. Russia, poor, shamed and unhappy Russia, raises her bruised and shaggy head, and wonders, "Is there something doing in Russia. There is not one movement in Russia, and another in America. The movement was the same, and he was not ashamed to say that it was the Spirit of God."

Journal Through the East.

The speaker then gave a rapid resume of his journey through the east. He was in Egypt when Lord Cromer had the guns and full-armed soldiers paraded through the streets of Cairo to impress and suppress the people. The boys on the streets are talking of revolutions. The land of the dead is alive with agitation.

From Egypt he went across the Red Sea into India, and there was the same cry everywhere heard. He was there at the anniversary of the Sepoy mutiny, and heard it then. The speaker had talked with natives, missionaries and military men, and there was great anxiety that there was an outbreak. There were no social or political material, declared the speaker. They were deeper than that. They were religious. The only remedy was a new belief and principle, and that could be implanted now except by the gospel of Jesus Christ.

A Great Revival.

There was a great revival under way in India at present. It was as great an outburst of spirituality as that in Wales. The people in many sections had been visited in strange ways. He declared that there was an abundance of evidence of the gift of tongues, perhaps the most wonderful example of this the world has seen since Pentecost. He spoke of visiting a prayerful man, he had never seen anything like it in his life. The Spirit of God was upon them, and when he looked into their faces he almost thought he saw Gethsemane, so great was the agony of petition depicted there.

China Awake.

The greatest news of the world came from China today, said the speaker. What had long been prophesied had now come to pass. Napoleon once said, "The world sleeps China. Let her sleep. If she ever awakes, God help us."

China was now awake. From Mongolia to the southern border she was now awake, a homogeneous, patriotic whole. There was a national consciousness. There was now ready to reckon with the world, and he was hoping that the day of reckoning did not come while China was heathen. China hates the west with a perfect hatred. The danger in the east was not from Japan, but from China. And this problem is America's problem. From the standpoint of a square deal and of human vengeance, China was right. Sir Robert Hart once said that the white man had more rights and privileges in China than anywhere else. China was wrecked and ruined by the troops that went to Peking to rescue the legations. There was something doing in China now. That nation was moving. The only hope was in the fact that China had repudiated Japan. She does not want heathen training. She wants British and American training. This, then, was the strategic moment for the men of the west to put a new spirit into China and save that nation.

Better Type.

There was a better type of Christianity in Korea than in any other eastern land, declared the speaker. There was such a moving of the Divine Spirit in Korea that has not touched this old world since Pentecost. The Koreans would be the evangelists of the Orient. Japan could not wipe out Korea. Christianity had come with new stamina, new patriotism, and a new manhood. The rapine and slaughter of Japan could not wipe this nation out.

Japan's Experience.

The Japanese nation had dreamed that if he put on western attire he would be received as civilized. That this was not the case he is beginning to find out. He may dress like the westerner, and he may learn the language of the west, and still be a barbarian, a little more dangerous than before. That nation has discovered that it must have a religious impulse, and it would gladly welcome any religion that
