MOBILE COMPANY GETS 27 RECRUITS IN WEEK

More Wanted, Especially Bandmen of Experience.

Recruiting for the mobile company of the Canadian Garrison Regiment, which was very slow in the first weeks following the authorization of the company, took a spurt during last week, when twenty-seven men made application for enlistment and were sent up to the C. G. R. Up to the present the total number of recruits is about forty, and it is expected that a greater proportion are now soldiering for the first time. Very few returned men have re-enlisted in the company. Sergt.-Major J. Rawlings, who is in charge of recruiting for the mobile company, stated today that he still needs 225 men, and he is anxious also to get bandmen for the C. G. R. band. Returned men are preferred, but any man who is physically fit can pass the physical test is eligible. Sergt.-Major Rawlings' office is in the Carling Block, where applications for enrolment should be made.

TO REDUCE THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN MORTGAGE FROM \$15,000 TO \$10,000

A considerable amount of regular London Presbyterian business was squeezed in on Tuesday between the hours allotted to the Forward Movement conference of the presbytery.

An interesting item of business of the afternoon was the request made by Rev. W. J. Knox that the First Presbyterian Church be remitted to reduce its mortgage from \$15,000 to \$10,000, an indication of the good condition of the congregation finances.

Rev. N. H. MacGillivray and H. E. Thornloe, with two elders from their St. Thomas congregations, were appointed a committee to name standing committees of the presbytery.

The annual meeting of the laymen's committee and the Laymen's Missionary Association proposed by Prof. Patterson was agreed to by the presbytery. In view of the illness of Rev. L. A. Matt of Aylmer, a committee was appointed to convey to him the sympathy of the presbytery and assist in arranging for pulp supply.

LT.-COL. L. H. NELLES AWARDED A BAR TO D. S. O. DECORATION

Continued To Lead Men in Battle Although Wounded.

The Gazette of London, England, gives the following particulars in connection with the winning by Lt.-Col. L. H. Nelles of the bar to his Distinguished Service Order: "Lieut.-Col. Lafayette Henry Nelles, D.S.O., M.C. 4th Battalion, 1st Central Ontario Regiment—This officer led his battalion in an attack on two villages, Bourlons and ground under heavy fire. Although wounded in the leg by machine gun fire he continued to lead his men to the close of the fight, encouraging and inspiring his men. (D. S. O. gazetted Nov. 19, 1918, as a Major).

Lieut.-Col. Nelles, whose father resides at 24 Prospect avenue, went overseas in 1915, as a captain of a draft of 250 men from the 33rd Battalion. He was attached to the 1st Battalion, 1st Canadian Division, receiving promotion for his gallantry on the field he was put in command of the Battalion. The wound which he received when he won the bar to his D. S. O. was a slight one in the arm, but after being three weeks in the hospital, he was able to rejoin his regiment. The latest news is that he is in Germany with his regiment.
