COMMISSIONER PAYS FAREWELL VISIT TO S. A. CITADEL HERE

T. H. Howard Was General Booth's Chief of Staff.

GIVEN GREAT RECEPTION

Tells Interesting Facts of the Work Done Along Various Lines.

Commissioner T. Henry Howard, the aged chief of staff to Gen. Bramwell Booth of the Salvation Army, was given a wonderful ovation as he rose to address a crowded audience in the Salvation Army Citadel on Clarence street here last night.

The cheering and clapping lasted several minutes. It was the commissioner's first visit to London, and it will be long remembered in Salvation Army circles here. Commissioner Howard is on his way to Chicago on his farewell tour. He was one of the founders of the Salvation Army, and was the right-hand man of the late Gen. William Booth for many years.

Commissioner Howard stated that he brought greetings from Gen. Bramwell Booth, who, it was hoped, would visit Canada soon. There had been no slackening of the army's operations. It was still trying to make the world a better place to live in. It was well named "the army of the helping hand."

Thousands Saved.
The speaker proceeded to back up his statement by telling of a number of cases in which the Salvation Army had reclaimed men and women. Thousands in the city of London, England, had been saved through the army's ministrations. He also touched on the work being done in the missionary field in India. The Salvation Army had 5,000 centres of operation in that great country. There were 500 schools under the direction of the army, and the children were being brought up in the settlements of the principle staunch advocates of the principle of them had grown up to be officers.

Citing a few of the callings these Salvationists in India were called upon to fill, he mentioned the occupation of preacher, teacher, doctor, lawyer, banker, nurse, matrimonial agent and undertaker. All were in the course of the day's work.

Work Among Criminals.
The criminal class of India numbered some three million people, and had been a great source of trouble to the Government, which had finally called on the Salvation Army for help. Over 5,000 of these lawless thieves were now in settlements under the direct care and influence of the army, and were learning to be useful citizens.

Less than four years ago, when the sense of economic grievance that rankled in the hearts of North Dakota's farmers had been fanned to a flame by the refusal of the legislature to establish a State-owned terminal grain-elevator, a man named Arthur C. Townley jumped into a small hired automobile and began by a farm-to-farm canvass the organization of the Non-Partisan League. For months the old line politicians regarded this "flivver campaign" as a joke, but today they see Mr. Townley's league of farmers grown to a membership of more than 200,000, with a political organization in thirteen states, representation in the U. S. Congress, and completely in control of North Dakota's government.

The St. Paul Dispatch terms the league "the most revolutionary political machine that ever gained complete autocratic control of legislative affairs in any state in the Union," while The Minneapolis Tribune speaks of it as "Townleyism, the political prairie fire that is now raging in North Dakota and spreading to surrounding states," but, as The New York World reminds us, "North Dakota and her people will pay the bill and the rest of the country will profit by the demonstration."

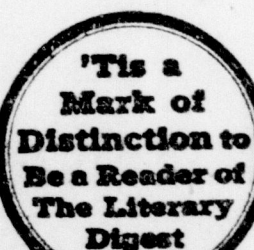
