ST. RAILWAY AGREEMENT RAILROADED IN COUNCIL

Aldermen Persistently Refuse to Accept Advice of City Solicitor to Protect People's Interests.

HAMILTON, Aug. 18.—(Special)—The city council had a long session this evening on the by-law embodying the terms of a new deal with the street railway. Time after time a majority of the aldermen ignored the advice of City Solicitor Waddell and voted down clauses in the interest of the city which he had prepared and which he pleaded with them to insert in the by-law. Not only was he voted down, but he was attacked by some of the Catearact clique who peevishly demanded to know why he dared to draw up these amendments and place them in the hands of aldermen not in clique.
