

the Lower 54.7. These results to my mind are highly satisfactory. The papers throughout show indication of careful and thorough training. Will you kindly convey to the students my congratulations on the success of their efforts."

Mr. J. W. Tucker, B.A., Professor in the High School, Montreal, was the examiner in the French subjects, he writes as follows: "I enclose to you the result of the French examination, which was both searching and severe, more so in the 1st Class. These results are satisfactory and encouraging. They are the best proof of the diligent application of the pupils to their studies, of the proper use they have made of their time and opportunities, and of the careful teaching they have received. They are besides a strong argument in favour of the zealous and energetic prosecution of French work. The answers were intelligent and the spelling good. In the High School such results as these would be called splendid. In the 1st Class the marks range between 85 and 67, with an average of 74 per cent. In correcting the papers I deducted one mark for each mistake in spelling or incorrect answer. This you see is severe marking. I was more lenient with the 2nd Class, deducting only half a mark for each error in spelling."

Three of our pupils have passed successfully the examinations for Matriculation in Arts, at Bishop's College, Lennoxville.

Another encouraging fact in connection with the work of the College is that five of our best young men, of whom four are matriculated in the Arts course, have made application to be admitted as theological students at the M.D.T.C. next September. One of these young men will be engaged as colporteur during the summer.

We are grateful to the Ladies of the Sabrevois Committee for their endeavour to promote the interest of the Mission, and especially to their President, Mrs. M. H. Gault, for her encouragement and help in our work during the past year.

Before closing my report, I beg to acknowledge the kindness of the Editor of the *Church Guardian*, Dr. L. H. Davidson, B.C.L., for sending gratuitously the *Church Guardian* to our pupils.
