

ARSON SQUAD BURN CHAPEL

Forty Thousand Dollars Damage Caused by Fire in Welsh Methodist Church.

HUNGER STRIKE AGAIN

Attempt Made To Blow Up Bolton Town Hall—Warrant for Miss Pankhurst's Arrest.

LONDON, July 5.—A Methodist chapel, in the Welsh sea-coast town of Pwllheli, whose construction recently cost \$40,000, was destroyed by fire this morning, and an attempt was made also to burn down the Baptist tabernacle in the same town.

This is the fourth case of sacrilege in northern Wales during a week. As is usual, when an incendiary fire occurs at the present time, the militant suffragettes are suspected by the authorities, but no evidence was found to incriminate them.

Another supposed attempt by militant suffragettes to commit an outrage on public property occurred at Bolton, Lancashire, this morning, when the caretaker of the new Town Hall, which cost \$150,000, discovered a parcel containing explosives in the letter box. A fuse which was attached had been lighted, but had gone out.

Gibson was sentenced to be hanged next Wednesday, and his counsel laid the case before the department two or three weeks ago. Of course a matter of such grave importance should receive full consideration; but it is barbarous to keep the unfortunate youth, as well as his aged parents and other relatives, in suspense for some days, because somebody is a-holidaying.

There is a good deal of doubt as to whether the case against the expressed in some quarters about the guilt of Gibson. It is felt that the case against him was not complete, and if one thing more than another will bring about the sentiment in favor of the abolition of hanging, it is the possibility of some poor wretch suffering the extreme penalty after conviction on evidence that was not absolutely reliable.

The fourth of July in the Canadian west furnished the usual crop of fire incidents. In Winnipeg an enthusiastic U. S.-an wildly waved the stars and stripes while a regiment of Canadian soldiers was passing and shouted "Hurrah for the American eagle!"

At Moose Jaw an American was set upon by a number of youths, and the flag that he was waving was trampled in the dust. There would be no excuse for incidents of this nature if people would only keep the flag of our brothers across the line, but do not want to see too much of it in this country. No doubt these unpleasant occurrences will be exaggerated in the American papers, but there is nothing but the kindest feelings here for our neighbors.

It was the Toronto Electric Company that had trouble on Friday, when a fierce storm broke and interrupted the flow of current which propels the street cars, lights many homes, and turns many wheels in Toronto. The Hydro, which has had its share of trouble lately, came thru the storm without difficulty. It is satisfactory to know that both concerns are doing their level best to provide for such a contingency as occurred on Friday. Neither one can afford to have a faulty system, but even with the best insulators and the best equipment, the elements are dangerous at all times, and liable to destroy the usefulness of either system for a time. The argument, therefore, is all the stronger for the linking up of the two systems, so that power users may not have to experience the difficulties that have seriously delayed business since the coming of Niagara power.

STRIKERS MARCH AT FUNERAL OF COMRADE
PATRSON, N.J., July 5.—Two thousand striking silk mill workers, a fifth of the women, marched today at the funeral of Vincent Madonna, a striker who was shot and killed in a recent riot. The men all wore red ribbons on their coat lapels, the women red waists and sashes. William D. Haywood and Carlo Tresca, under indictment for inciting the strikers to riot, strode at the head of the procession. There was no disorder.

BUILDING LESS THAN LAST YEAR

Slight Falling Off for June, But the Eastern Cities Are Holding Up Well.

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Bryan to Begin His Peace Negotiations
Secretary of State Expected to Start With His Proposed Pact This Fall.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan expects to begin this fall actual negotiations for concluding his proposed general peace pact with the other nations of the world.

Because of the absence from Washington of most of the ambassadors and ministers it is not feasible now to do much more than supply to them the outline draft of the project, for transmission to their own governments.

Secretary Bryan expects that the treaty by governments which already have promised to give the project consideration would be increased to thirty by including all the great powers.

Toronto Man Drowned At Kingston Wharf
Thomas McLeod Fell Into Water at Swift's Wharf and Never Rose.

KINGSTON, Ont., July 5.—Thomas McLeod, night watchman on Steamer Kingston, got off at Swift's Wharf this morning to take the stern line, and by some accident was thrown into the water and never rose. Coroner Mundell will hold an inquest if body is recovered. McLeod was 24 and belonged to Toronto.

Grain Steamer Ashore.
KINGSTON, Ont., July 5.—The steamer Ames, from Fort William to Montreal, with grain, ran ashore at Salmon Point, forty miles west of Kingston, during Friday night. The Donnelly Wrecking Company of this city has sent an outfit to her assistance.

"Don't Want to Get The Guy Pinched"
Man Found Crushed by Train Refused to Give Story of Accident.

BERLIN, July 5.—(Special.)—Daniel Wicks, 135 Ontario street, Stratford, was found crushed by a G. T. R. freight train in the yards here this morning. When found by the conductor he was still alive and was rushed to the hospital. To the surprise of the hospital staff he lived for three hours, although both legs and one arm were amputated. He was conscious for a time, but absolutely refused to give any information as to how he got to Berlin, saying "I don't want to get the guy pinched." He claimed to have had \$175 when he left Stratford.

Coroner Honsberger empaneled a jury this morning, and after viewing the body adjourned the inquest until next Tuesday.
