

ARSON SQUAD BURN CHAPEL

Forty Thousand Dollars Damage Caused By Fire In Welsh Methodist Church.

HUNGER STRIKE AGAIN

Attempt Made To Blow Up Bolton Town Hall—Warrant for Miss Pankhurst's Arrest.

LONDON, July 5.—A Methodist chapel, in the Welsh sea-coast town of Pwllheli, whose construction recently cost \$40,000, was destroyed by fire this morning, and an attempt was made also to burn down the Baptist tabernacle in the same town. This is the fourth case of sacrilege in northern Wales during a week. As is usual, when an incendiary fire occurs at the present time, the militant suffragettes are suspected by the authorities, but no evidence was found to incriminate them.

Another supposed attempt by militant suffragettes to commit an outrage on public property occurred in Bolton, Lancashire, this morning, when the caretaker of the new Town Hall, which cost \$150,000, discovered a parcel containing explosives in the letter box. A fuse which was attached had been lighted, but had gone out. Miss Annie Kenney and Miss Rachel Barrett, the first of whom was undergoing 18 months' imprisonment, and the second nine months' imprisonment, on a conviction for committing malicious damage to property, were released from jail again this morning, suffering from the effects of a "hunger and thirst strike." Many of the imprisoned suffragettes refrain from taking both food and water, and their condition consequently weakens very rapidly, so that the authorities are obliged to release them from jail more frequently on the "cat and mouse bill," by which they are set at liberty when ill, and re-arrested on their recovery.

Miss Sylvia Pankhurst failed to appear at Bow street police court this morning, to answer a summons charging her with inciting a crowd to raid the official residences in Downing street of Premier Asquith and Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George on June 29, when a violent conflict between the police and the suffragettes with their sympathizers took place. A warrant was at once issued for her arrest.

Death of Mrs. Walter Nurey. With the death of Mrs. Walter Nurey (Katherine Euter, Isabella Coxwell), which occurred on June 27, and who for many years had been a silent sufferer, another member of the Coxwell-Powell group, two of the oldest of the older Toronto families has passed away. She was the elder daughter of the late William Henry Coxwell, of Charlton-Kings, and Abington Manor, and Dovedale, Gloucestershire, England, where the family have resided in constant succession since the beginning of the reign of Queen Elizabeth. Mr. W. H. Coxwell, who was a cousin of the late John Small, formerly M. P. for East Toronto, and latterly collector of customs, was for years an official at the Osageo Hall. On her mother's side, who was Mary Powell, and who died in 1908 at the age of 93, Mrs. Nurey was a great-granddaughter of William Dummer Powell, chief justice of Upper Canada in the stirring days of 1812, General Sir Isaac Brock's chosen friend and adviser. Chief Justice Powell married Anna Murray, of the well-known Norfolk (Eng.) family, connected with the Brocks of Guernsey. Mrs. Coxwell's father, Captain John Powell, a naval officer, and the eldest son of the chief justice, was at one time sheriff of Wellington and Lincoln and usher of the Black Rod in the assembly of Upper Canada. Captain Powell married Isabella, eldest daughter of Major-General Aeneas Shaw, adjutant-general under Brock. Sophia Shaw, another sister, and a great aunt of Mrs. Nurey, was engaged to General Brock at the time of his death at the battle of Queenston Heights. By marriage through other branches of the family, the deceased was closely related to the Shaws, Baldwins, Scaddings, Jarvis, Ridouts, Gwynnes, etc. She was married in 1877 at Winnipeg to Mr. Walter R. Nurey, then deputy minister of agriculture for Manitoba (now inspector of public libraries for Ontario) where she was an active church worker, and was pre-deceased by her little daughter, Faith Fairfax, many years ago. As a faithful member of St. Augustine's Church, Toronto, she endeavored herself to many of the women's guild of which congregation have placed on record their deep appreciation of her keen interest in the work.

Bryan to Begin His Peace Negotiations

Secretary of State Expected to Start With His Proposed Pact This Fall.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan expects to begin this fall actual negotiations for concluding his proposed general peace pact with the other nations of the world. Because of the absence from Washington of most of the ambassadors and ministers it is not feasible now to do much more than supply to them the outline draft of the project, for transmission to their own governments. Secretary Bryan expects that the twenty governments which already have promised to give the project consideration would be increased to thirty by including all the great powers.

Toronto Man Drowned At Kingston Wharf

Thomas McLeod Fell Into Water at Swift's Wharf and Never Rose.

KINGSTON, Ont., July 5.—Thomas McLeod, night watchman on Steamer Kingston, got off at Swift's Wharf this morning to take the stern line, and by some accident was thrown into the water and never rose. Coroner Mundell will hold an inquest if body is recovered. McLeod was 24 and belonged to Toronto.

"Don't Want to Get The Guy Pinched"

Man Found Crushed by Train Refused to Give Story of Accident.

BERLIN, July 5.—(Special.)—Daniel Wicks, 135 Ontario street, Stratford, was found crushed by a G. T. R. freight train in the yards here this morning. When found by the conductor he was still alive and was rushed to the hospital. To the surprise of the hospital staff he lived for three hours, although both legs and one arm were amputated. He was conscious for a time, but absolutely refused to give any information as to how he got to Berlin, saying "I don't want to get the guy pinched." He claimed to have had \$175 when he left Stratford. Coroner Honsberger empaneled a jury this morning, and after viewing the body adjourned the inquest until next Tuesday.
