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WERE DINNER IS REALLY AN EVENT. A good dinner anywhere is an event worth remembering. But in Belgium, where the people are without means of feeding themselves, thanks to the German administration, it is a daily epoch-maker.

The accompanying photograph, taken at Bergen op Koom, is representative of the food situation throughout the occupied parts of Belgium. The refugees act the time of day by the hour when the dinner soup is distributed. Though the distribution is always punctual, the people are always waiting for it.

Since this photograph was made these men and thousands of others have been torn from their wives and babes to be transported to Germany, to give the product of their labor to the Germans.

The first reason given for this brutal course is, as usual, military eccessity. In order to give themselves an excuse the Germans announced that they would take the unemployed on the ground that they might as well be employed where they would be useful. But who is "employed" in Belgium? That is, who has steady employment? In general, of course, there is no such thing to be had, and so the Germans found plenty of "unemployed."

Already they have deported n.ore than 100,000 Belgians, and they are continuing to drive the pitiable procession into an alien land at the rate, according to latest estimates, of 4,000 a day in Antwerp alone.

Thus deprived of what protection their men folk could give them, the women and children are more completely than ever dependent on the Belgium Relief Committee.

We who have plenty certainly owe it to them to send contributions of whatever size our means allow to the Belgian Relief Committee, at 59 St. Peter street. Montreal or to the local branch in the nearest community or dis-

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Over 100,000 Belgian workmen have already been snatched from their homes and taken into slavery in unknown places. The mothers, wives and children who beg for their release are driven back by the Huns in utter despair. Neutral protests have failed to change Germany's inhuman purpose, nor can the Allies free Belgian manhood until the Teutons

But we can save the women and children through the neutral Belgian Relief Commission, which is feeding three million of them. We can express our indignation, and our sympathy with our Ally's wrongs, in a practical way, by giving more liberally than ever to the Belgian Relief Fund.
