

FUSILIERS DEFEAT FREDERICTON IN FAST AND EXCITING GAME

CAPITAL TEAM LOSES BEFORE LARGE CROWD

Goalies Turn in Fine Exhibition as Saint John Wins, 4 to 1

UNLEASHING a terrific attack, the Saint John Fusiliers hockey team turned back the Fredericton sextette, 4 to 1, before 1,500 fans at the arena last night. The Fredericton team, although defeated, were by no means outplayed and were only on the short end of the score by superb net minding by Wilson and the lack of a necessary scoring punch.

Although fairly loose in the initial frame, the game speeded up in the final two periods to one of the fastest on local ice this winter. Both teams displayed remarkable flashes of speed on the forward line while the Saint John defense left nothing to be desired. The Fredericton team, although light, turned in a pretty game. Bud Stern, on the defense, was one of the best men on the ice, blocking like a veteran and making some pretty rushes.

Charles Gorman, who has just returned from Newburg, N. Y., where he added fresh laurels to his crown, dropped the puck for the first face off. He was greeted with a great hand by the crowd.

KEATING STARS

Keating, at centre for the locals, was doubtless the best man on the ice. He gave a sweet exhibition of stick handling and poke checking and was aggressive at all times. Fraser, on the defense, used his weight to good effect last night, stepping into the light or Fredericton boys with stiff body check that hurt.

Charlie Wilson turned in a sensational net-minding game, making several remarkable saves. On several occasions he saved the rubber and diving on the puck. In the Fredericton net, he was in rare form and came out called on to turn back a veritable flood of rubber.

Joe Payne and Harold Drummond handled the game and kept it fairly free from offside and penalties. Payne dished out the penalties while Drummond checked on the play.

The first score came after about eight minutes of play in the first period when Keating made a golf stroke of Thompson's pass out from the corner, the rubber bouncing past Hickson for a trick score. Fredericton tried hard to notch the equalizer and the period was featured with many solo attempts by players on each team.

SECOND PERIOD

Fredericton forced hard in the second stanza and had almost almost knocked Wilson off his feet with a terrific drive after a lone rush. Both forward lines were selling in fast after the rebounds and the goalies came through with pretty saves and fast clearing. Fraser put down a hat trick blocked by McKenna who failed to clear. Fraser nailed the rubber and denting the twine behind Hickson. Fredericton missed plenty of opportunities when they intercepted passes by the Saint John team.

Keating was forced out of the game temporarily by a cut over one eye that called for two stitches. He was given a loud ovation on his return to the game.

The third period featured the best hockey of the game. Fredericton were pasting shots at Wilson with clockwork regularity, but the Saint John goalie saved time after time. Kato Keene sagged the twine behind Wilson on a pretty pass from Bud Stern after both boys combined for the length of the ice. Keating put his team two up after a lone attempt for the length of the ice drawing Hickson from the net.

HOPPE REGAINS 18.2 BARKLINE CHAMPIONSHIP

Takes World Crown From Hagelacher by 1,500 Points to 1,387

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Willie Hoppe, 36-year-old billiard star, last night won back the world's 18.2 barkline championship by defeating Eric Hagelacher, 1,500 points to 1,387.

The final block, producing what veteran critics asserted was the finest display of bark line billiards ever spread before a New York gallery, developed a desperate duel, with the tide of battle swinging back and forth on the hinges of sensational runs.

Trailing by 183 corners after Hoppe had added 23 to an unfinished string of 43 from the second block, the champion cut loose with his most brilliant rally of the match, clicking off 283 corners with machine-like regularity. When he piled up another collection of 108 in the next inning, to make a lead of 202, Hoppe appeared distracted.

But the former champion, whose reign extended over a period of almost 17 years before he finally bowed to Jake Schaefer two years ago, finally overhauled his rival with a spectacular run of 286, 129 and 48.

Hagelacher outscored the challenger in last night's block, 547 to 500, but Hoppe's lead of 183 from the second block, combined with his masterful play last night, staved off the closing spurt.

Morgan was bleeding freely from the nose at the close, but finished gamely. At the final bell both boxers were attempting to slug, although they seemed tired.
