SPRINKLERS FOR WEST END SHEDS RECOMMENDED

Council Committee Passes Motion in Favor of Installation

MAJORITY RULE QUESTION RAISED

Permission For 12,000 Gal- lon Oil Tank Is Favored at Meeting

"Saint John is in a unique position in that it is the only part of the British Empire where majority rule does not apply and the time has come to dissolve that condition," Commissioner Frink said at a meeting of the committee of the whole this morning referring to the fact that a unanimous vote of the City Council was required on a bond issue.

FOR SPRINKLERS.
The proposition to install a sprinkler system in the West End sheds was brought up by Commissioner Bullock. He reported that he had secured the services of a firm to estimate the cost of installing a sprinkler system in the sheds. The estimate was \$2,000. The committee recommended that the proposition be put to a vote.

Under the 90 per cent. insurance required to secure the low rates for sprinklers had been installed the amount of insurance would be increased to \$225,000, an increase of \$23,000, and the premium would be reduced to \$2,000, a saving of \$6,222.41. Against this saving there would be an interest and sinking fund payment of \$8,273 on the bond issue for the cost of the installation, leaving a net reduction of \$5,273.41. The replacement value of the buildings, which were totally destroyed would be between \$500,000 and \$600,000, he said.

PRECAUTION JUSTIFIED.
Mayor White said that it did not protect from a fire originating outside the building and the city engineer replied that provision had been made for some outside sprinkler protection.

His Worship said it must be remembered that in dealing with this matter they were considering a very important one to the port and they were justified in taking every precaution to see that the sheds were protected from danger of destruction from any cause.

Commissioner Frink said he felt the council was under an obligation to take every reasonable precaution to protect the chief asset of the city and the sprinkler installation be regarded as reasonable.

He would like that the specifications should include everything and all tenders should be on the entire work and not a portion of it. The trouble last fall was that each tender seemed to have his own specification. The commissioner did not want that repeated. Commissioner Bullock said that he was any action could be taken every commissioner would have to be satisfied, as a bond issue required a unanimous vote, and he would like to see the wishes of the commissioner of public works.

Mayor White remarked that there might possibly be other things the city might be "dissolved" from.

Commissioner Bullock then moved that a sprinkler system be installed in the West End sheds and the city engineer be instructed to prepare plans and specifications satisfactory to the Board of Fire Underwriters together with an estimate of cost and submit it to the council.

This was seconded by Commissioner Harding and carried.

FOR NEW OIL TANK.
An application by the Imperial Oil Company for permission to install a 12,000 gallon tank for lubricating oil on their premises, Broadview Avenue, was taken from the table on motion of Commissioner Harding, seconded by Commissioner Bullock, was recommended to council.

Commissioner Harding reported that he received an invitation to attend the 20th annual convention of the Smoke Improvement Association, to be held at Chicago, June 25, 26, 27, 28.

An application by the Civic Power Commission for a bond issue for the extension of the hydro lines to East Saint John was laid over until all the members of the council were present.

On motion of Commissioner Frink the New Brunswick Telephone Company were given authority to place guy wires and anchors in Egbert, Metcalfe, Charles and Wentworth streets and to place an additional conduit in Union street, between Prince William and German.

LOTS OFFERED.
Commissioner Frink reported that he had received an offer from the Robert Maxwell estate to sell to the city two lots in Seely street for \$2,000. One of these was on a street shown on the old Town of Fort Beaulieu plan and approved by the Legislature in 1916.

The plan, made by William Murdoch, showed the street to have been laid out in 1850. The communication was laid on the table.

Roy Campbell, held this afternoon at St. Paul's (Valley) church, was attended by a representative body of citizens, particularly of the professional life of the community in which he had been so many years prominent. Venable Archdeacon A. H. Crowfoot read the service and the full choir sang "Lead Kindly Light" and the St. Andrew's Interment took place in the cemetery. The late Dr. Campbell was called to the Bar in 1889 and was elected to the Council of the New Brunswick Law Society and a past president of this society and was a member of the Nova Scotia Bar at the time of his death. He was also very much interested in the Law Society of the University of New Brunswick, formerly the law school of Kings College and for many years the lecturer on real property and was the present lecturer on Roman law.

Dr. Campbell was possessed of a very amiable and cheerful disposition, and he was greatly missed by the profession. He enjoyed a large and lucrative practice and was held in the highest esteem by his brethren of the law as well as the public generally. Ever courteous and kind and considerate and helpful to all with whom he came in contact, his memory will be cherished by all who knew him. His popularity was made manifest by the vote which placed him at the head of the poll at his first election as a representative of the City of Saint John in the local legislature.

His death has evoked a profound sense of loss to this society and the public. Therefore Be It Resolved that the Society express its deep sense of loss in the passing of Dr. Campbell and its sympathy with his widow and son, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mrs. Campbell.

A resolution of respect at the death of Dr. J. Roy Campbell was passed at a special meeting of the Church of England Institute Council last night. It expressed great appreciation of his services to the Institute. Dr. Campbell had been a resident of the Institute from 1907 to 1909.
