FIRE PREVENTION SCHOOL SUBJECT

NEWSPAPER MEN AND ARMY OFFICERS AMONG PRISONERS
Jails in Sao Paulo, Santos and Rio de Janeiro Crowded.

REBELS STILL FLEE
Some of Those Taken May be Banished to Amazon River.

Buenos Aires, Aug. 6.—Hundreds of military officers and civilians have been arrested in many parts of Brazil, in connection with the military uprising in Sao Paulo, according to special despatches to La Prensa today.

Among the prisoners are Admiral Sridistis Macaranas, Captain Newton Braga of the Aviation Corps, Mario Rodrigues, director of the Rio de Janeiro morning newspaper, Correio de Manha, Felix Duarte, its manager, Paulo Bittencourt, editorial director, and several former deputies who have been friendly with the newspaper.

Rebels Are Sought.
Rebel forces which evacuated Sao Paulo City last week, are reported to have reached the borders of Matto Grosso closely followed by Federals.

Explosion Kills 3; \$1,000,000 Damage
Tons of Steel and Brick Flung Hundreds of Feet by Blast.

Chicago, Aug. 6.—Three workmen are known to have been killed, half a dozen others seriously injured, and property valued at more than \$1,000,000 destroyed in an explosion at the plant of the Illinois Steel Company in Gary, Ind., late last night.

K. of C. Convention Gets Pope's Blessing
New York, Aug. 6.—The apostolic benediction, in the form of a letter signed by Cardinal Gasparri, Secretary of State of the Holy See, was bestowed upon the international convention of Knights of Columbus which opened here yesterday with about 5,000 members, including Canadians, attending.

The sum of \$25,000 was appropriated at the pre-convention meeting of the Supreme Board of Directors of the Knights of Columbus to the disabled war veterans of the world war. The money is to be used by the veterans' organization in maintaining a commemorative Nelson service.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 6.—Harold A. Kullerby, 28, one of the best known airplane pilots in the country and who during the world war, as a lieutenant in the Royal Flying Corps bagged 14 German planes, and Henry Duncker, 34, of Hudson, Ohio, were killed last night when a commercial aeroplane in which they were flying went into a nose dive and fell 2,000 feet near Hudson, Ohio.
