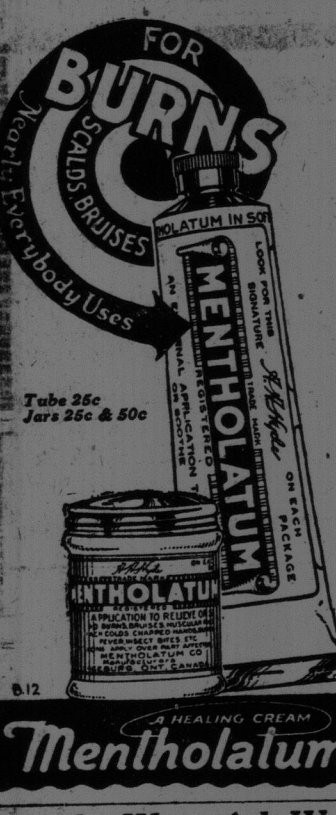

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Lady Elizabeth uses the shield of arms of her father, the Earl of Strathmore, but the same coat-of-arms as the Duke's, the lion and the unicorn. The Duke's shield will be encircled with the garter, and his wife's with a wreath of oak leaves, to balance the garter.

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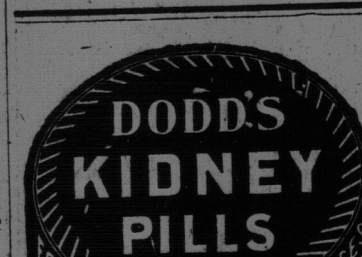

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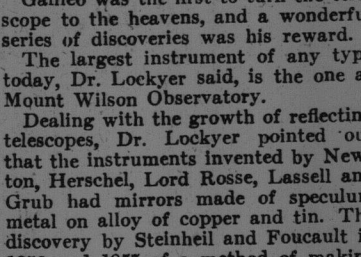
