Mr. Belyea wishes to explain that at the time it was proposed holding the races he sent an invitation to Halifax and was advised that a crew could not come here on that date. He then wired to J. W. Ryan of the Internal Revenue Service in Boston, Mass., and asked him if he could send a crew to compete in the sports. In the meanwhile a favorable condition of Rev. Father McMurray at the Four of St. Louis or a four from the champion eight oared crew of New England, which is his own club. If either of these crews accepts the invitation Mr. Belyea points out that provision must be made to meet the necessary expense. He says it will be a great boost to rowing in these parts if a crew from Boston, one from Halifax and one from St. John meet in these sports.
