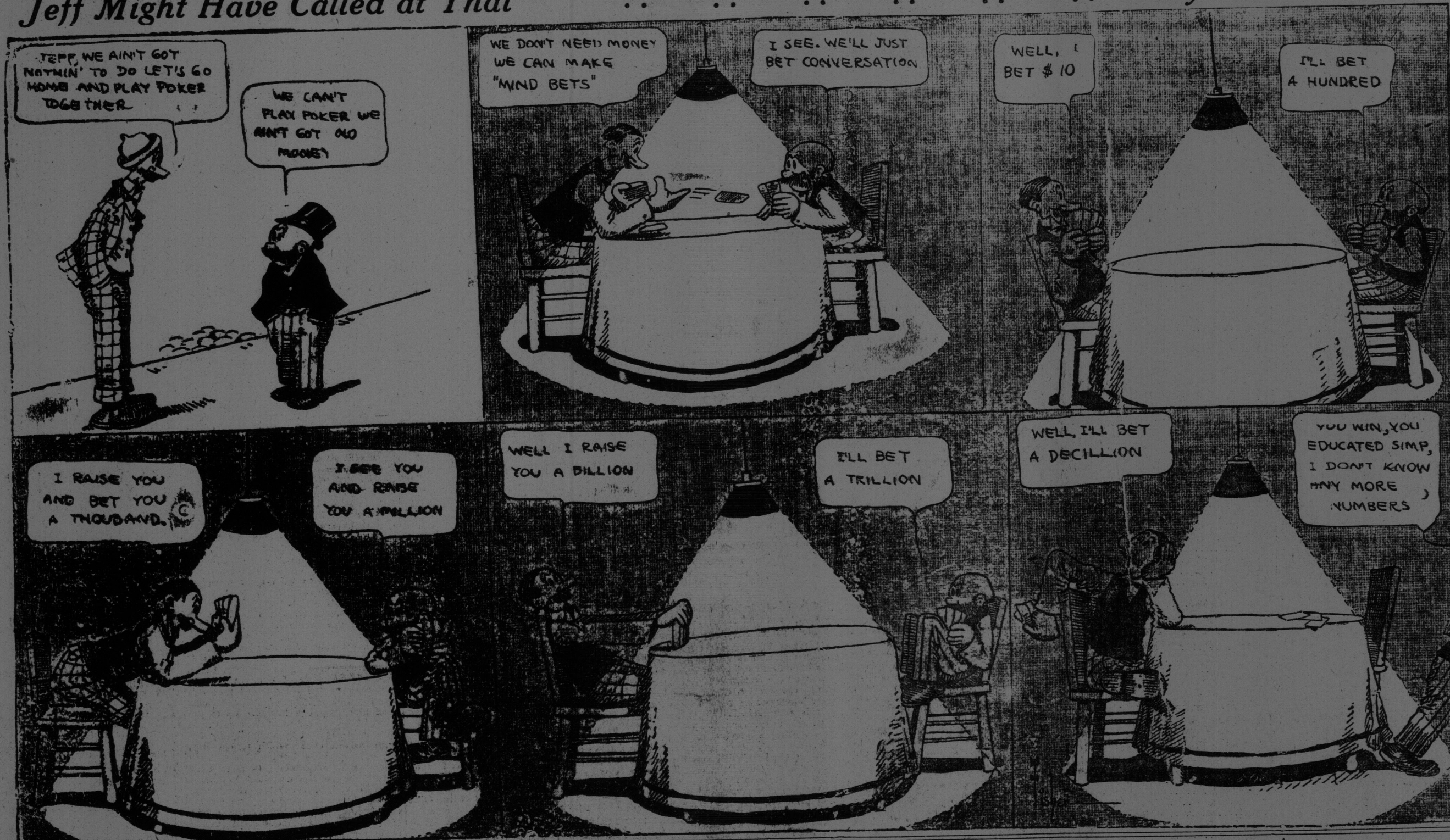


Jeff Might Have Called at That

Look For Ring Revival in Milwaukee

But have all the matches they wished. However, the promoters have taken a different view of the matter. It was formerly the custom among Milwaukee promoters to give the fans a good rest during the baseball season, having their opening about the last of September, or once in a while staging a good match on Labor day. The Milwaukee promoters feel it is only right to wait until the commission is named before attempting to hold shows and in this they are very wise. Milwaukee had the reputation of being the greatest boxing center in the country ten years ago, and there is no reason why it should not be so again. With good, clean boxing contests it is only natural that Chicago enthusiasts will want to attend them, and with the two big cities to draw from the promoters should be able to stage some swell matches of a high class.

While boxing clubs all over the country are planning big bouts for Labor Day the Milwaukee clubs are keeping very silent, so silent in fact that the fighters are wondering what it all means, as they expected that as soon as the Hedding boxing bill became a law there would be nothing left for them to do. Brown, has just recovered from his attack of appendicitis, which developed right after his contest with Gross. There is little doubt now that Anderson was a sick boy when he fought Gross, for the illness had hold of him then and put him in bed the day following the battle. Gross might have beaten him under any circumstances, but it is only fair to suppose that, had Anderson been in his normal condition, he would have put up a better battle than he did. He intends to rest a while before taking to the game again. If he is wise he will take a good long rest, or he is very liable to experience the same setback that Ad Volagast did after he was taken down with appendicitis, which got him just the day before his proposed contest with Freddie Welsh for the championship. An illness of that kind usually leaves a mark, and it is doubtful whether the lad will ever be as good as he was before being taken down. It seems to be a case of hard luck, for he had a promising future.

ANOTHER PROP FROM UNDER "EMERGENCY"

Berlin, Aug. 7.—In reviewing the decision of the British government to station several naval cruisers at Bermuda, Capt. Persius, the naval expert of the Tagelblatt, sees the first breach in Lord Fisher's policy of concentrating every available ship of the British navy in home waters and an indication of the waning of the tense Anglo-German rivalry which has kept the two nations on the verge of war for a decade.

From this point of view Capt. Persius finds the action of the British admiralty of more importance to Germany than to the United States. He says Germany also may take similar steps of deconcentration. He believes that in general the decision was dictated more by the desire to show the British flag than by actual necessity.

The Tagelblatt Rundschau today publishes a story referring to the possibility of Germany modifying its naval programme, in view of the acceleration of construction of three battleships of the British navy recently announced by Winston Spencer Churchill. The German admiralty, however, says there is no question of such action.

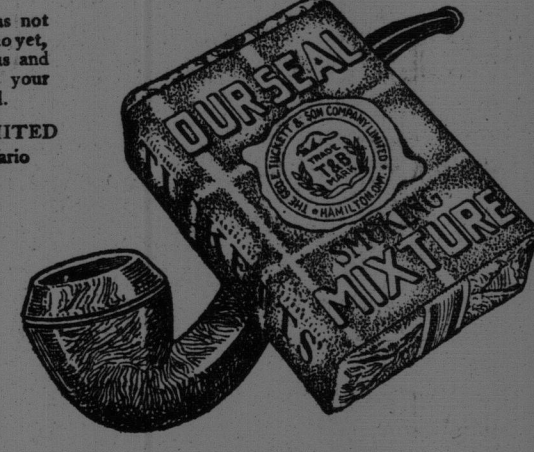

SHUT DOWN CHAMCOOK FACTORY FOR A TIME
St. Andrews, N. B., Aug. 7.—The directors of the Canadian Sardinia Company have decided to suspend operations in their factory at Chamcook for a short time. The business has not been running satisfactorily and the indebtedness has been piling up very fast, causing the directors to take this action. It is expected that a reorganization will be effected in a few weeks and the work will be resumed at the factory. All the employees were paid off today.

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
