(Special to Times.) Fredericton, N. B., July 17.—A telegram from Hanley, Sask., announces the death of Albert E. Everett for many years prior of Windsor Hall this city.

He had been making a tour of the west and was struck with paralysis while visiting his father in law, Dr. M. O'Neill in Hanley. His wife started for the west last week but returned home upon receipt of word while in Montreal, that her husband's condition was hopeless. He died on Saturday.

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PARLIAMENT TO TAKE UP ITS WORK AGAIN TOMORROW

Business to Be Resumed as if There Had Been No Recess—The Outlook as to Elections

(Special to Times) Ottawa, July 17.—The members are beginning to gather for the resumption of the business of parliament tomorrow, but the attendance for the first few days does not promise to be large.

The house will meet at 10 o'clock in the afternoon, with the usual formalities. Unfinished business will be taken up just the same as if the previous had adjourned twenty-four hours previous by instead of two months.

It is probable that the programme for the day will be government bills but the opposition will no doubt have a number of questions to ask and the answers will be interesting.

The situation in reference to reciprocity will in all probability not crystallize until the 15th has been taken in Washington on Saturday next. The consensus of opinion is that there will be a deadlock over reciprocity and supply and that the house will dissolve within six weeks and a general election be held.

Hon. Frank McGuire and Hon. Robert Rogers were here today conferring with Mr. L. Borden and the presumption is that plans are being formulated to force the government to the country.

QUEEN AND CHILDREN TO VISIT GERMANY

Berlin, July 17.—(Canadian Press)—According to today's papers Queen Mary of England, the Prince of Wales and Princess Louise will visit the great German naval review at Swinsand on August 30, at which the Austrian and Danish fleets and the Prince of Monaco will also be guests.

The British party will first visit their country relatives, the Lowager and the Duchess of Mecklenburg, Stralitz, and following the naval review, will proceed to Potsdam to be present at the review of the autumn parade of the guard on September 1.

BRITISH MONEY FOR CANADA

Toronto, Ont., July 17.—(Canadian Press)—As a result of the visit of W. Leonard Palmer of the Financial News of London to Canada, that publication will take more active steps than ever to encourage the investment of British capital in the dominion.

Mr. Palmer arrived in Toronto yesterday after a trip through the west as far as Victoria, and during his five months stay in this country he has visited every important centre and nearly every representative man of the country.

He said last evening that in the west he found that money was pouring in from England and settlers were arriving in thousands, and so long as things would remain as they are, both capital and settlers would continue to come in in increasing amounts and numbers.
