Some \$740 More Than 1921 for Harbor Lots

Bidding as a Rule Not Keen - Hilton Bays Gets a Courtenay Bay Privilege for \$991 - Last Year it Sold for \$15.

The sale of the fishing privileges in St. John harbor, which was carried out this morning in the county court rooms, netted \$4,133.50, as compared with \$3,393.44 last year, an increase of more than \$740.

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
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GOOD THINGS COMING TO THE THEATRES OF ST. JOHN

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Lost Sight Restored, She Works for Blind Porto Rican Girl, Stricken Five Years Ago, Sees Again, and Returns Home to Start First "Blind" School There.

New York, Dec. 30.-Happy in her returning eyesight, Louisa Cordero, stricken blind five years ago when she was teaching in the high school at San Juan, has returned to her native island to start building the first school for the blind in Porto Rico.

When she lost her eyesight, through an accident, she was a young girl of 17, and she had just begun her education to aid her in her work, has secured for her the personal promise of President Harding's interest and co-operation.

She had read many books. There were schools for the blind-but not in Porto Rico. Blind people could learn to be useful and self-supporting.

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ONLY SIX REMAIN Jump to \$10,000 Year License Closes B. C. Liquor Warehouses.
