Question of Conservative Opposition Has Not Yet Been Decided On

OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—The storm which raged in parliament during the week flattened out into calmer conditions yesterday and today with everywhere evidenced expectancy and prophesy as to what the next steps in the House of Commons would be.

ANOTHER AMENDMENT?

But whether the Conservatives will vote another amendment is not known. Many of the Ontario and Quebec members went home for the week-end, and those who remained in general instances are understood to be occupied in conferences of various kinds, where plans are being carefully laid for the operations of the coming sittings of parliament.

FATALITY PROBED

Aged Man, Found Dead in Shack, Has Cut in Back of Head

MONTREAL, Jan. 16.—Investigation was started by detectives last night into the death of N. Paquette, 82, who was found dead in a shanty, in the yards of Dominion Electric Company, Limited, last evening. When the body was discovered by a night watchman, it was thought he had died of Diefenbaker's disease. However, the police were informed that Paquette had received his pay of \$89 yesterday and that \$4.90 was found in his pocket. Examination of the body at the morgue showed a cut at the back of the head. Footprints leading from the east side of the plant property to the shanty were later found in the snow.

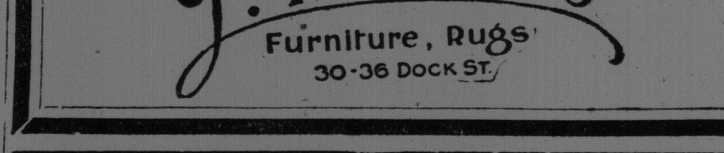

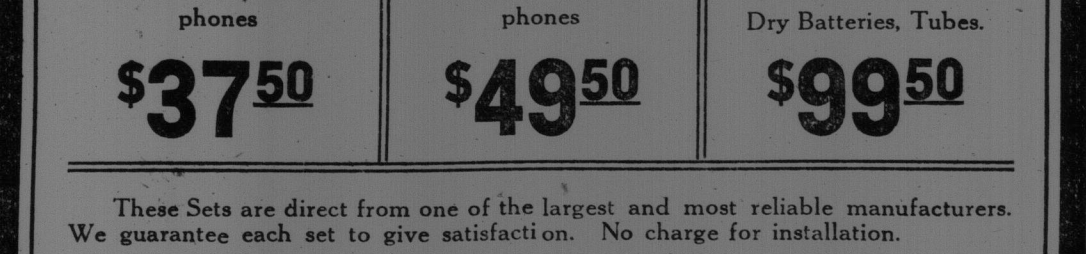
