J. A. CHISHOLM, K. C.,

SPEAKS ELOQUENTLY

OF JOSEPH HOWE

The first of this season's series of addresses before the members of the Canadian Club was given last evening, after a dinner at Bond's restaurant, by J. A. Chisholm, K. C., a former mayor of Halifax, on Joseph Howe, Rev. J. A. Kuhnring, president.

Mr. Chisholm is the author of a work on the famous Nova Scotian and has made public many of his speeches and letters.

Mr. Chisholm prefaced his remarks by commending the principle of encouraging, amongst Canadian clubs, the giving of lectures on subjects relating to Canadian people of prominence, remarking that in 1861, in the legislature of Nova Scotia, Howe had himself expressed his entire approval of the practice of recording the good deeds of the honored dead, of a nation preserving records of them, decorating their tombs and the national monuments erected in their memory.

Mr. Chisholm then proceeded to give a description of the life, past and present, and that he did so capably and well, was shown by the hearty attention and appreciation manifested throughout his discourse. He said Joseph Howe would always stand forth as one of Nova Scotia's greatest men. His public career had been begun in 1827 when he was 23 years old when engaged in newspaper work. He became owner and proprietor of a newspaper and was very successful. He made his first platform speech in 1834 and his eloquence and sincerity won him many friends. Howe became a member of the provincial legislature and after confederation, which he opposed, he entered the federal government. For many years he advocated policies which showed his statesmanship-like grasp of affairs but which did not always serve to make him popular. He always worked for reform, not for retaliation, the speaker said, and was faithful to the people who had elected him to office.

Before the address a resolution from the New Brunswick Historical Society, urging that Fort Howe should be improved as a park, was read by the secretary. A resolution was passed by the Canadian Club along the same lines. It will be forwarded to J. B. Harkin, minister of Dominion Parks.

The secretary reported that Hon. J. D. Hazen would address the club on Nov. 17 on "The Work of the Marine Department."

After the Canadian Club luncheon last evening a number of members of the club were invited to meet Mr. Chisholm at the residence of Richard O'Brien, in Wentworth street. Among those present were Bishop LeBlanc, Mr. Chapman, S. G. Rev. Mr. Duley, Dr. R. F. Quigley, Mayor Frink, Dr. H. S. Bridges, Commissioner Agar, J. Hunter White, W. F. Burdett, D. R. Jones, W. J. Mahoney, A. M. Belding, Dr. J. D. Maher, John Keefe and others. Rev. Mr. Kuhnring, president of the club, was unable to be present, as he had another meeting.

Mr. and Mrs. O'Brien gave their guests a most cordial welcome, and a delightful two-hour session in general conversation, refreshments, followed by the party separated. It was a very gracious tribute to the distinguished visitor, and followed the splendid reception given him by the Canadian Club must have given him a favorable impression of St. John hospitality.

WANT EXPERT TO COMPLETE PLANS FOR MODERN HARBOR

In order to pass a bond issue for additional expenditure in the paving of Garden street and the north side of King square, a special meeting of the common council was held yesterday afternoon with the full board present.

Besides this business the mayor brought up the subject of the visit of the two cabinet ministers to St. John in order to draw up a plan for laying out the harbor on a more modern basis. His worship said that if he had an opportunity he would request the ministers to use their influence that an engineer of first class ability be sent to this city in order to draw up a plan for laying out the port in such a way as to meet the requirements of a much augmented trade.

R. J. Armstrong was heard with reference to the wet wash laundry which he is building at the corner of Union and Pitt streets, and against the construction of which protests had been made by property owners of the vicinity. Commissioner Wigmore moved that the matter lie on the table till the next regular meeting of council.

Commissioner Agar submitted the draft of a by-law whereby the St. John Railway Company would be compelled to use 1 1/2 inch rails instead of 2 inch rails in the city. He said he would take the matter up a month hence.

Dr. F. Park Lewis, of Buffalo, declared "We are destroying the eyes of the large number of school children by the burden of continuous near work to which they are subjected. Let us have more thinking and fewer books," he declared.
