SAVE GIRL AS A PLANE PLUNGES INTO THE OCEAN

Philadelphia, Aug. 29—Perched precariously on the fabric-covered tail of a fallen airplane, a Stone Harbor, N. J., girl calmly awaited rescue in the ocean off Sea Isle City while life guards and coast guards fought their way to her through a heavy surf.

With her were Captain Frank Little of Philadelphia and Walter Krouse, son of Mayor Clarence A. Krouse of Stone Harbor, owners and pilots of the plane, and both former members of the Royal Flying Corps. It was their first accident in more than 1,500 hours in the air.

The aviators, with their passenger, whose name they refused to disclose, had flown from Stone Harbor to Atlantic City and were returning by moonlight. Flying low off a pier at Sea Isle City, the plane, for an uknown reason, elli into the sea. It was a land machine, equipped with wheels instead of the pontons of a seaplane, and its forward end, weighted by the motor, sank into the water. The fabric of the wings and lighter tail held it afloat, with the tail, elevators and rudder pointing upward.

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
