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STUCK BY A TORNADO.

Circus Animals Run at Large in the Streets of Chicago and Create a Panic. There was another panic in Chicago Thursday night says special. It was not created by exploding fireworks and runaway teams, as on the lake front April 20. Two runaway teams were responsible for last night's wild excitement on the West side, but their escape was attended by fatalities. This was not because of any disinclination on the part of the elephant masters to crush out a few lives, but because the hour was late and the route they took was not crowded by people or vehicles.

Elephants Loose. About 1 o'clock two big Asiatic elephants, belonging to a circus, were being escorted by their keeper from their quarters, on the corner of Hamilton and Arns to the Chicago and Northwestern station, where they were to be shipped to Evanston. The beasts were chained together and traveling quietly on Lake street toward their destination. An Ashland avenue dog came bounding into the middle of the street, directly in front of the elephants, and barking as if only a worthless cur. Whether the huge brute were anxious for a frolic after his long confinement, or whether they were really frightened at the barking which he was unable to say. At any rate, they raised their trunks and started off at full speed down Lake street.

Butler Leaves Washington and Porter. Washington, D. C., May 13.—Hostilities between Gen. Butler and Admiral Porter have been temporarily suspended. Gen. Butler has removed his headquarters back to Lowell, and night, and about one-third less than in the year. Butler says something new. Butler had proposed to fire a party shot, as he expressed it, by prohibiting a copy of Admiral Porter's report to Secretary Welles about Gen. Grant, but he said to your correspondent before he left this evening that he had not intended to do so.

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THE SAMOAN HURRICANE.

ABOUT ONE-THIRD OF THE HOUSES OF THE ISLANDS, WHICH WERE DESTROYED BY THE HURRICANE, HAVE BEEN RECOVERED. The supposed body of Capt. Schoonmaker of the "Vanilla" found and buried—Other Officers' Bodies Identified—The German and American Consuls Share the Expenses of Interments.

SAO FRANCISCO, May 13.—Samoa news reports the condition of affairs here. The municipal authorities collect the bodies of the victims of the storm have been recovered, and it is supposed the greater number of them were either washed far out to sea, or are fastened in the coral reefs and sunken in the wreckage. A body, supposed to be that of Captain Schoonmaker of the "Vanilla" which was found on the beach four miles from Apia, was buried on a German plantation near the spot where it was washed ashore. Paymaster Arambulo which was positively identified by the bodies as they were all greatly swollen and discolored by the warm water and many were horribly mutilated. Very few were clothed and it is impossible to tell whether they were Americans or Germans so the consuls of the two governments employed natives to bury all the bodies that should come ashore and agreed to share all the funeral expenses.

It is supposed nearly all bodies of officers and men of the German gunboat "Dieter" are imprisoned in the wreck. Since the storm there has been considerable sickness of a very serious nature and the hospital has been filled. All of the ship surgeons have been staying at the sick.

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
