Bad Weather Retards Operations at the West Coast Stations.

(From Thursday's Daily.)

A desperade encounter between steam-whaler Orion and a giant sulphur-bottom whale took place a few niles off the Sechart station on Tuesday. The little steamer had aiready disposed of two hump-backs and had buoyed them to leave her free for more hunting when the sulphur-bottom was sighted. The weather was becoming thick but the captain calculated that he had time to take the big whale and pick up the others before it became too foggy for the steamer to make the station, so chase was given.

The sulphur came up a few yards from the Orion, after a chase of about half a mile, and the gunner, aiming hi weapon from the little bow platform, shot his harpoon into the great leviation. Unluckily the bomb at the end of the harpoon failed to explode and the whale dived before another shot could strik him. Goaded by the pain of the harpoor and yet practically unifyined by its presence in its body the whale went to a great depth and sped away from the little craft from which line was so rapidly paid out that the hawse-holes had to be kept cool with water.
