The bleeding man was hurriedly taken to Fredericton on engine No. 11, and was operated on at Victoria Hospital by two physicians.

He did not long survive the operation, for about twelve o'clock he died.

Fred King was twenty years old and his home is at Megond, York County. At the time of the accident he was working for Mr. Robinson, lumber operator for James Murdie, of Calais, Me.
