The anniversary services in connec tion with the celebration of the 65th year of the founding of Centenary Methodist churc h were begun Sunday morning. Dr. Potts of Toronto was the speaker at both morning and evening services, and his eloquent discourses on both occasions were attentively followed by large congregations.

The contributions to meet the extra expenditure in connection with new heating apparatus have been exceptionally good, and are very gratifying to the stewards of the church. Two furnaces have been installed to take the place of the old one and the heating area doubled. The system with the necessary piping, carpenter and mason work, cost close upon \$2,000, and it is to meet this expense that efforts are being put forth during the anniversary week. ATTEMPTED HOLD UP.

Train Crew in the States Tell Rather Peculiar Story.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6 .- According to the crew of the Philadelphia & New York express train on the Pennsylvania railroad, which left Washington at 6.10 tonight, two unsuccessful attempts were made to hold up the train at Havre de Grace and Perryville, in Maryland, by two men, one of whom was a negro. The men escaped. It is believed the men boarded the train at Baltimore. Just as the train approached the long bridge at Havre de Grace, the express messenger, Herbert Carter, sew a white man prying the man thrust a revolver through the crevice which the bar had made. He ordered the messenger to let him in, but the messenger replied by firing his revolver and pulled the signal cord for the engineer to stop.

When the train came to a standstill. Conductor Sibley ran forward to the engine and there found a colored man standing on the coal in the tender with revolver in his hand. He was ordered to come down. At first he refused, but after a short argument he left the tender. Going back to the express car, Sibley was told by the messenger what had happened, but the

white man had disappeared. The train resumed its journey, and when it reached Perryville, on the farther side of the bridge, the two men again appeared, one on the tender and the other on the front platform of the express car, which was immediately behind the tender. The train was again promptly stopped, but before the two men would be captured they disappeared in the darkness.
