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ATTORNEY GENERAL BAXTER ASSIDUOUS IN HIS EFFORTS TO HAVE CARS OVER NEW BRIDGE

His negotiations with Street Railway officials result
in an immediate start towards securing service
between City and Lancaster.

The St. John Globe of last evening published a comprehensive statement in regard to the street railway crossing the new bridge and the interest taken by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter in having the work rushed. The Globe article is as follows:

Progress is being made in the effort to get an early street car service over the new Falls bridge and a through connection with the main line. Information given the Globe today by Attorney-General Baxter proves this, and it further proves that the attorney-general himself had been most assiduous in his efforts to secure the service which is so desired by city people and by Lancaster, Fairville and Carleton people as well. A batch of correspondence beginning on August 25 last and ending with September 17 showed that on the first named date the attorney-general directed the company's attention to Coun. O'Brien's suggestion that the track be run across from the west side to the eastern end of the bridge. The attorney-general brought this to the attention of the company's manager, to F. R. Taylor and R. B. Emerson of the board of directors, and at the request of Mr. Hopper and Mr. Taylor met them on the spot in company with engineers and reached the agreement that led to the levelling of the Carleton anchorage to provide a right of way. This was followed by an order of the company to the United States Steel Products Company for the necessary rails which are to be shipped tomorrow, Sept. 23, and will, it is expected, be here in time to have that portion of the service in running order by October 8, the date the company recently promised.

The larger question involved in the application to the Railway Commission for crossing rights at Douglas Avenue, was also the subject of vigorous correspondence by the attorney-general, who took up various phases of the question with the street railway company, the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Railway Commission, the provincial Minister of Public Works, the local Commissioner of Public Works and other interested parties and brought about an understanding between all, which resulted in the various interests, the city, the company, the province and the railway agreeing to the plan for the diamond crossing in accordance with the company plans. Some difference of opinion arose over the question of grade, and Mr. Baxter promised to do his utmost to have the government treat this alteration in grade as part of the bridge approach so as to obviate a further cause of trouble and delay. As a result of getting all to agree to the application to Ottawa as to the grade the necessity of an agreement at Ottawa was obviated and the way was cleared on Sept. 14 for the company to open negotiations with four different concerns looking to the earliest possible delivery of a diamond crossing, which their letter of Sept. 17 indicated was done on that date. These arrangements, which the correspondence proves were largely due to the attorney-general's efforts, suggest not only a west side crossing of the bridge early next month, but a through service before the winter sets in.

F. R. Taylor, K. C., when spoken to, said the order for the avenue crossing was approved Tuesday by the Railway Commission. The four concerns asked to give prices and delivery dates for the diamond crossing had quoted prices, but said nothing about time of delivery. They were now being communicated with for further information. Mr. Taylor declared there had not been a moment's delay on the company's part. Mr. Hopper supplemented this information by the statement that the west side bridge extension will be shipped tomorrow from New York.

"MISSING WITNESS" ANXIOUS TO TESTIFY IN MANITOBA CASE

Horwood says Salt Inspect-
or on work on Parliament
Buildings, wants to tell
what he knows.

Winnipeg, Sept. 22.—When the preliminary hearing of the former Manitoba ministers was resumed this morning, Mr. A. J. Andrews informed the crown, in response to a question that he had a general retainer for all the defendants and would represent Sir Rodmond Roblin.

R. A. Bonner, crown counsel, recalled Mr. E. F. Johnston's statement at the opening of the case that he represented Sir Rodmond and spoke of Mr. Johnston's "withdrawal from the case."

Mr. Andrews then continued the cross-examination of Horwood, asking him about estimates and other documents put before the legislature last session.

Horwood denied that he made any alterations in Salt's book of calson records.

"Your change from lies to truth was coincident with change of government," asked counsel.

"No," was the reply.

but had been stopped by United States officials. He declared he was "trapped into a so-called tribunal of United States authorities who used the evidence taken before the Mathers Commission."

Counsel wanted to know if Harry Whittall was still his counsel. The witness replied that he had no money to pay counsel. "Whittall," he said, "said that if I could not pay him it was nonsense for him to keep on attending court for me, but if he could do anything for me he would."

Horwood said he had tried to sell his house and it was in packing up his goods in the attic that he found the letters marked "destroy." He gave these letters to his counsel.

Friendly with the "Missing Witness." The witness told of his various consultations with crown counsel and stated in reply to questions that he was friendly with William Salt, formerly known as the "missing witness."

Mr. Andrews inquired diligently as to his conversations with Salt in reference to the case.

"Salt," said Horwood, finally, "hoped that you will examine him; he wants to tell you everything."

"Well, he'll certainly be gratified," exclaimed Mr. Andrews, with some heat.

"I didn't know I was so important," commented counsel.

The witness was questioned about his report as provincial architect in 1914. He admitted that statements regarding a depth of 70 feet for a calson were "misleading."

Mr. Andrews wanted to know if

there were any papers of any kind in existence which might be of assistance to the witness in giving his evidence. Horwood said there were some telegrams. One, he said, was a telegram sent him by Andrews.

"That is, before the Royal Commission, for goodness sake, produce it," replied Mr. Andrews. The telegram was produced. It was sent to Horwood at Minneapolis and asked him to produce a certain letter before the Royal Commission. Horwood stated that from what his solicitor told him he did not think Mr. Andrews did right in sending the message.

The witness declared again that he never knew the sum which was included in the calsons to be handed by Kelly to Dr. Simpson. He knew of one sum of \$50,000 mentioned by Simpson and another sum of \$100,000 which Kelly told him "they" wanted, but that was the extent of his knowledge on the subject.

Mr. Andrews asked about Horwood's bank account. Horwood said he had an account and his wife had two savings accounts. The subject was not pursued further. The witness said that his solicitor had sent in his resignation to the government, but he did not know that it had ever been accepted.

"I am now in the employment of the government," he added. He stated that no proceedings had ever been taken against him on account of any of the offences he had testified to committing.
