The British schooner Abbie Keast of 107 gross tonnage, badly damaged in Sunday's gale, was towed into Southwest harbor late amorday night by a coast guard patrol boat.

The schooner was picked up by the patrol boat off Petit Manan after all her sails had been carried sway and 40,000 feet of lumber washed from her deck. Both anchors were lost. The stern was punctured by lumber which shitted in the hold.

UGAR COUPONS AND THE DEALERS

alers Say They Should be Done Away With as Al-lies Are Not in Such Dire Need as During War.

The local wholesalers who were is-successful ending of the war, believe that the coupons should now be done away with, as they claim the Allies are not in such dire need as was the case when the war was at its height. However, in view of the fact that su-tant is still required oversean in large However, in view of the fact that sugar is still required overseas in large quantities it is stated that the coupons will remain in force until such time as they were issued for, namely, February 15th, 1919, and conditions warranting the same might refrain the Food controller from eradicating the coupon method even on this expiring date. The coupons were issued to the merchants of the city and when presented at the brokers or refinery the dealer is granted an allotment of sugar, which is based on 80 per cent. of his 1817 sugar trade, and once he draws the allotment allowed him he is not entitled to any addition al amount.

WILL LOOK OVER THE SILICA MINES

Petrolia Ontario Man En route to Sydney-If Everything Right Company Ready to Spend Volumes of Money.

Harry Blanchet, of Petrolia, Ont., was a visitor in the city yesterday, coming in from Fredericton. When seen at the depot prior to the departure of the Moncton express, he stated that he was en route to Sydney, N. S., being interested in the silica mines near that city, and was en route on business. Asked if he was one of a company recently formed at that place to further the works at the mines, he retaliated that his mission east was to investigate the stories relative to these mines which were reported to be a promisting proposition, and deserving of comment, especially among American syndicates and whom he understood had visited this section referred to, and had reported things very promising. Recently he returned from Southern Arizona, where he investigated the rumors relative to such mines at this place. True, he added, these mines promise much for the future but the sites of the same had been gathered up long before his arrival there.

As soon as the mines, yet undeveloped in Nova Scotia, promised much they would be considered by the firm he represented, and who are ready to spend volumes of money should an opening be at hand, and no other syndicates or companies had acquired controlling interests.
