Regular Meeting Held Yesterday

Considerable Business Transacted at Session of Women's Hospital Aid—Reports Received—Hospital is Crowded—Other Business.

Much important business was transacted at the regular meeting of the Women's Hospital Aid, held yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade Rooms. Mrs. J. Verne McLean, first vice-president, presiding.

It was decided that the Hospital Committee will find out prices of furniture from St. John firms and also ascertain the cost of furnishings at Toronto stores. Mrs. W. W. White gave an account of meeting with the Hospital Commissioners saying that the Aid Committee had been most courteously received, and that she felt the Commissioners are willing to do all in their power towards making the Hospital more comfortable and complete. The Hospital Committee consists of Mrs. Walter Morris, convenor; Mrs. W. W. White, Mrs. A. W. Adams, Mrs. A. H. Gilmore.

There was some discussion regarding the purchasing of linen for the Hospital, but the matter was left until a subsequent meeting to be decided. Mrs. R. Duncan Smith resigned as convenor of the House Committee, as she holds the office of treasurer. Mrs. McLean welcomed the new treasurer, whose report showed expenditures for the month \$97.51, receipts \$122.50, and a balance in the bank of \$24.99.

Mrs. McLean asked that any member who could offer hospitality to delegates to the National Council of Women in June would kindly notify the secretary to that effect. Arrangements for the luncheon for the delegates to the national meeting were also made. Mrs. W. W. White being convenor of the Luncheon Committee.

A letter was read from the Board of Commissioners of the General Public Hospital thanking the Aid for fruit, flowers and gifts sent at Easter. The magazine report of the Presbyterian churches, Miss Jean Anderson, convenor, was read by Mrs. Fritz, showing that \$500-magazines and seven pamphlets had been collected. After the reading of the reports of the different committees the following were elected to the directorate for the ensuing year: Miss M. Carlin, representing St. Peter's parish, Mrs. F. Power, Mrs. John Owens, Miss Catherine Lawlor, and Miss Ada White.

The reports of the different committees included that of the physical committee, the social committee, the religious and the Girls' Work committee. All were of a decidedly encouraging nature, and detailed the large amount of work which had been accomplished by them in their respective spheres of action during the past year.

Mrs. M. Owens, the matron, in her report, stated that the accommodations of the guild had been taxed to capacity throughout the year, and owing to the fact that the house could accommodate but twenty-four, a great many had been turned away. The Social committee reported having raised over \$600 during the year by catering for banquets and in other ways. The annual Valentine Tea had been a success both socially and financially. Much work had been done in the Traveler's Aid department, both in visiting the trans-Atlantic liners on the West Side and attending the trains.

Miss Emily Hardley, the treasurer, reported the finances of the guild to be in a satisfactory condition. After the reading of the reports and election of officers, Rev. Father Duke in a brief address reviewed the work of the year and congratulated the guild on their splendid showing.

The officers for the coming year will be elected at the next meeting of the board of directors, which will be held at an early date.

Montreal, May 20—The prosperity of the Canadian Textile Industry is reflected in the annual statement of Canadian Cottons, Limited, which indicated a banner year in the history of the enterprise. Net manufacturing profits totalled \$2,600,000, as compared with \$1,600,000 for the previous year. After all deductions, the balance available for application to the common stock outstanding of Sinclair Consolidated, \$11,145,438 compared with \$10,628,626.

Winnipeg, May 20—Tenders have been called for a Provincial Treasury bond issue of \$250,000, at 4 per cent payable in New York, Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg. The tenders will be received up till noon, on May 26th in Winnipeg.
