MUST HAVE ROOSEVELT

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 14.—Following the indicated preference at yesterday's primary vote the republican county convention to-night adopted a resolution declaring for Theodore Roosevelt for president and instructing the delegates to the state convention to work to that end. The two men endorsed for delegates at large and district delegates to the national convention were instructed to support, recommend and in the event pledged themselves, if chosen, to vote for him first, last and all the time.

The opposition leader objected to the resolution as a violation of the immemorial rights of members of the house in England and Canada since confederation.
