Nothing of the sort appeared, but on February 4th a letter was received by the police from the management of The Free Press, stating briefly that the story was true and that witnesses could be produced to verify it.

Mr. Editor, the association of which I am secretary, would be only too pleased to know who are these five cowards, that the citizens of London are paying to protect them and their property.

Articles, such as the one I have referred to, lead the citizens to believe that the protection for which they pay is not to be relied on, and disconcerting results.

Mr. Editor, the citizens of London can rest assured that the police force is not asleep on the job, although at times it would appear to be the case.

Can you explain why there has been no serious crime since the arrest of two notorious characters a few weeks ago? The answer is obvious.

If the London Free Press will bring their witnesses and furnish complete proof that a hold-up of five of the London policemen actually took place as described in the association will donate \$100 to any charitable institution named by The Free Press.

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TUBERCULOSIS COSTS CANADA \$80,000,000

Yearly Loss Through Lives Wasted by Disease, Says Dr. Hill.

"Bacteriology" was the subject of an interesting lecture given by Dr. H. W. Hill at the public library on Thursday night, in connection with the Western University extension series.

Dr. Hill claimed that bacteria require tremendous quantities of water, and that the human body is a perfect incubator for them. He estimated that Canada loses \$80,000,000 annually through tuberculosis.

Hilderton, Feb. 11.—The Lobo Continuation School at Coldstream is proving a success, and the average attendance is now about thirty. At a meeting held in the town hall to organize a series of night classes for young people who cannot attend during the day, Howard Zavitz was chairman, and Miss Jean Grey, secretary. It was arranged that on Wednesday and Thursday evenings, Charles Wilson of Poplar Hill will teach farm power and measurement. Each Wednesday evening, Blair Grey will teach business banking and economics. On Monday evenings, Rev. W. A. Campbell will give lectures on co-operation, civics, and public speaking, and the principal of the continuation school, Miss Elsie Caverhill, will also teach a subject on Monday evenings. On Tuesday evenings, H. Zavitz, O. A. C. student, will discuss "Plant Life, and Natural Science." The Ontario Government has promised to fund the continuation school. The fee was not decided at the meeting. These night classes will be held in the Prince of Wales Hotel, Coldstream, and will be held until the busy spring weeks end. Community Clubs have been held this winter in many of the Lobo school-houses. On Thursday evening, the Bear Creek Club, S. S. No. 7, was organized with about 35 members. George E. Sinker is president; Miss Flo M. Caverhill, secretary, and Miss Irene Stewart, treasurer. A good program is promised for the next meeting, on Friday evening, February 25. The elevator and mill here has been kept quite busy since opening and seems to be giving good service. The executive of the Co-operative Company has purchased the lumber, coal and cement business of P. Clawworthy, and Clarence Charlton of Detroit is leaving a good position in the town to come to Canada and take charge of this end of the co-operative business. WINDSOR, Feb. 10.—The first annual report of the Border Hydro-Electric Railway issued today shows a net profit of \$23,335. The profit will be used for the purchase of 11 cars. The annual earnings of the company for the first year amount to \$236,373. Out of this sum all expenditures for upkeep, wages and repairs. The company set aside \$49,000 for interest on bonds and \$53,000 for a sinking fund.
