Betsy Ann, the beloved wife of Richard Burr, of the township of Euphemia, departed this life on the 5th inst., after an illness of only a few days. She suffered from an attack of apoplexy, but continued to improve gradually, giving the family and friends hopes of a speedy recovery, but on Saturday at 5:30 p.m. all their hopes were suddenly dispelled, as her condition clearly indicated that her end was fast approaching, and in a few minutes she quietly and peacefully passed away, in the presence of her husband and members of her family. The subject of our sketch was in her sixtieth year, and an active and consistent member of the Presbyterian church here for many years. On February 23rd, 1870, she was united in marriage to Richard Burr and their conjugal life proved a successful and happy one, their family consisting of five members, four of whom survive her. Mrs. Burr was of a kind and generous disposition, and in an abundant degree shared by her husband, making their home ever bright and cheerful with the sunlight of love and a shelter for many wayfarers on the path. The funeral service was held at her late home and was conducted by her pastor, Rev. M. P. Craig, who delivered an impressive discourse from Rev. 14, verse 13, after which her remains were conveyed to the Aughins cemetery for interment. The funeral cortege was one of the largest ever seen in this locality, and represented local and distant relatives and friends. She leaves to mourn her loss a faithful husband, three daughters and one son—Mrs. John Baird, of Alvinston, and Bella, Fred and Ila, at home—besides two sisters and five brothers—Mrs. Effie McLachlan, of Sarnia; Mrs. John Tanner, of Cumber; Mich. J. Lachlan Smith, of Aberfeldy; A. D. of Barton City, Mich.; J. L. of Detroit; Wm. E. of Algoma, and D. M., of Cairo.

A suit for alimony brought by Mrs. Flora McIlwain against her husband, William G. McIlwain, of Brooke township, was heard at the non-jury sittings of the Supreme Court held in London last week. Mrs. McIlwain alleged continued cruelty and misconduct on the part of her husband as her reason for leaving him, which the husband denied. A great deal of evidence was taken. Chancellor Boyd, who presided, awarded the claim for alimony, the amount to be fixed by the Master at London. Elliot & Moss, of Glencoe, acted for the plaintiff, and Hanna, Lesere and McKinley for the defendant.

Requests for grants to East, North and West Middlesex Women's Institutes of \$25 each were thrown down by Middlesex county council, after much discussion. The majority of the council held that expenditures must be cut down to as close a margin as possible. Grants to the county fairs and to the Farmers' Institute were also refused for similar reasons.

Mrs. C. Wilson and daughter Verna spent Sunday in West Lorne.

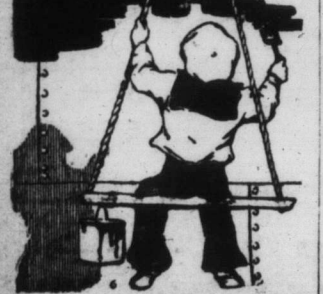
A number from here attended the services in Glencoe on Sunday.

Signing Petitions.

Fifty-three thousand electors in Saskatchewan signed a petition to the Scott Government, asking that its temperance legislation be not proceeded with until it had been submitted to and ratified by the people. That seemed quite impressive until Mr. Scott pointed out that 25 per cent. of these people had also signed a counter-petition. The ordinary man is too ready to sign nearly any petition presented to him. He knows the responsibility for a final decision rests upon someone else and by signing the petition laid before him he obliges a friend or gets rid of an importunate caller. Petitions for executive clemency in capital offences are generally signed with great alacrity by people who know nothing about the merits of the case but shrink from appearing hard-hearted. Now and then, however, an unfair burden is thus placed on the pardoning power.—World.
