## DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Alvinston will celebrate May 24th. There is an increasing demand for heavy horses.

Matthew Wilson, K. C., of Chatham died on Saturday.

Hydro-electric power was turned on at Parkhill on Sunday.

The price of milk in Ottawa has been reduced from 14 to 12 cents.

The time for filing Dominion income tax papers has been extended to May 31.

The potato boycott in London has proved a failure and the price remains at \$6 a bag.

The Scottish Trades Union Congress has passed a resolution in favor of liquor prohibition.

Middlesex county jail is just now harboring an unusually large number of prisoners for minor offences.

The St. Catharines Journal is the latest paper to suspend publication owing to increased cost of production.

The Bureau of Mines has issued a warning to the public to beware of vendors of shares in mining ventures.

M. D. Selkirk, postmaster at Leamington for nearly half a century, has resigned because the salary was too low.

The orthodox Mennonites in Manitoba and Saskatchewan plan to leave Canada this summer and establish a colony in the Mississippi valley.

The new fund of wearing overalls was started in Rodney when the pupils of the Continuation school went to school on Thursday garbed in blue jeans.

London street railway was tied up on Friday night through the employees going on strike for a raise in wages from 45 cents to 65 cents an hour.

A Hudson, Mich., man bought a quantity of potatoes last fall for \$7, and after using from the pile all winter he sold what he had left for \$8.

Alex. McLachlin of Cowal has resigned as a member of the Dunwich township council to accept a position in F. D. McLachlin's garage at London.

Over a hundred well-to-do Jews in Montreal are making final arrangements to return to Palestine. Many successful business men have decided to sell out.

The McCreery motion favoring a referendum on the importation of liquor into the province was carried in the Legislature by a majority of 73, the vote being 85 for and 12 against.

Joseph McTaggart, a live stock man from Alvinston, has purchased from J. Glover, the residence on the corner of Queen and Front avenues, Petrolia, formerly occupied by Dr. Smith.

Dr. Raymond Passot of the Pasteur Institute, France, claims to have discovered a way to make hair grow luxuriantly on bald heads. A slight surgical operation is all that is needed, he said.

The University Club of Chicago, with a membership of 3,500 bankers, business men and professional men, has started out to banish the stiff collar and fancy shirt in favor of blue chambray shirts and dark trousers.

It is understood that July 27 is the date which has been fixed tentatively for the taking of the liquor referendum in Ontario. It has been announced that the cost of taking the vote will be approximately \$300,000. This will be paid by the Dominion Government.

Maurice Cohen was fined \$100 at Owen Sound for false statements in advertising. Cohen came to Owen Sound a couple of weeks ago and advertised a \$15,000 stock for sale by merchandise adjusters. Boots, which were advertised as being worth \$7.50 a pair and selling for \$3.95, were shown to be worth not more than \$3. Other goods were found to be equally shoddy. Business was just beginning to boom when the information was laid.

## GLENCOE COUNCIL

The regular meeting of the Glencoe council was held in the council chamber on Monday, May 3rd. All the members were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

Communication from the county treasurer re deed of land for lot 1. Dean survey, was received and on motion of Messrs. Parrott and Davidson the clerk was instructed to remit \$4.40 costs to secure the deed of the said lot.

On motion of Messrs. Parrott and Davidson the assessment roll was accepted.

On motion of Messrs. Davidson and McCracken the following accounts were ordered paid:—Mrs. Wm. Quick, 2 teams for 1 day scraping streets, \$16; Wm. McKee, working on street and hauling tile, \$12.29; Jas. Wright & Son, telephone, and supplies for town hall, \$4.44; S. Thompson, salary for April, \$40; one night care of hall, \$50; James Poole, salary as assessor, \$65; postage and stationery, \$1.25; Wm. Muirhead, 56 hours' work on streets and drain, \$22.40; George McCracken, 7 hours opening drain, \$3.15.

On motion of Messrs. Parrott and McCracken the date of the court of revision of the assessment roll was set for May 28th at 8 p. m.

Ry-law No. 266, Main street drain by-law, received its three readings and was provisionally passed.

On motion of Messrs. McCracken and Davidson the treasurer was authorized to invest \$1,500 of money accrued in the sinking fund in Victory Bonds maturing in 1923.

## GLENCOE BOARD OF TRADE

J. H. Laughton of London to Address May Meeting—Good Musical Program

The Glencoe Board of Trade have secured Mr. J. H. Laughton of London to address their regular monthly meeting to be held on Monday evening, May 10, in the town hall. Mr. Laughton, who will talk on Community Work, has for some years held a prominent place in the publicity movement for Middlesex county and can give many valuable hints on community improvement. **REV. DR. STALKER HURT**  
Prominent Presbyterian Clergyman Struck by Automobile in Detroit

Rev. Dr. Daniel D. Stalker, one of the best known Presbyterian clergymen in Michigan, and a native of Albion township, was run over and perhaps fatally injured by an automobile while crossing Cass avenue in Detroit late Saturday evening. Dr. Stalker's identity was not established until Sunday, and then only after physicians and nurses had made repeated efforts to induce him to speak a few words.

Dr. Stalker is 73 years of age. For more than a quarter of a century he was in charge of First Presbyterian church at Calumet, this being a record for unbroken service in the Michigan Presbytery. He retired from active work last year and spent the winter at his old home near West Lorne. Recently he has been visiting relatives in Glencoe and vicinity and supplying at odd times various pulpits.

Reports received yesterday morning by his friends in Glencoe say that Dr. Stalker is still unconscious and there is but slight hope for his recovery.

An endeavor will be made to have a team organized in each of the townships to add interest to the sport locally. It is also intended to form a county league. Much enthusiasm was manifested at the meeting and the prospects are for a good season's sport on the diamond.

The Ladies' Aid had a very successful year and show a balance of cash on hand of \$529.27.

## DEATH OF MRS. BRAY WILLEY

The death occurred at the family residence near Strathburn on Friday morning of Mrs. Willey, wife of Bray Willey, who survives her. Mrs. Willey was very highly respected, and a large circle of friends and relatives will deeply mourn her loss. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon at Oakland cemetery.

## WEDNESDAY HALF-HOLIDAY

Glencoe storekeepers have agreed to close their places of business on Wednesday afternoons for the summer season, commencing on May 19th and continuing until September 1st, with the exception of any week in which a legal holiday occurs.

## MISHAP AT FUNERAL

A Wardsville correspondent writes: The funeral of little Harry Draicey who was killed by the upsetting of a load of hay at London took place to Oakland cemetery. Before leaving London the mourners, riding in Mr. Draicey's automobile, met with an accident on Adelaide street, the occupants being thrown out and the car damaged when it collided with the curb. The damaged car was left at a garage, the mourners continuing their journey in another. They were met at Oakland by Rev. Dr. Hunter; J. F. McGregor, superintendent of the Methodist Sunday school; Mrs. McKee, public school teacher, and a number of Harry Draicey's schoolmates, who acted as pallbearers.

## BUILDING MATERIAL PRICES

Little hopes were entertained for an immediate decline in the prices of building material at the annual meeting of the Southwestern Ontario Retail Lumber Dealers' Association, held in St. Thomas last week. Business for the past year was reported to have been good. Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows:—President, Arthur Sanders, St. Thomas; vice-president, H. Ludlow, Leamington; secretary, F. Clarke, Glencoe, re-elected.

## WHOLESALE PROPERTY SOLD

The Methodist church property at Newbury was disposed of by auction last Friday. George McCallum of Glencoe being the purchaser of the parsonage at \$500 and the church at \$400. The fixtures and horse sheds went to other parties at about \$200. For a few years past the Methodist congregation at Newbury has been identified as a circuit with the Glencoe congregation. This was found unsatisfactory in view of the decreasing attendance at the services there and it was finally decided a short time ago to close the church entirely and later to sell the property.

## MADE A LIFE MEMBER

At a meeting of the Glencoe Board of Trade executive on Tuesday evening a life membership was conferred on A. E. Sutherland, who has filled the office of secretary-treasurer of the organization since its inception some eight years ago and retired at the recent annual meeting owing to pressing business engagements. The resolution was moved by Dr. McLachlin, seconded by A. B. McDonald and carried unanimously by a standing vote, kindly reference being made to Mr. Sutherland's faithful and efficient services.

## FIELD CROP COMPETITION

The Mosa and Ekfrid Agricultural Society will hold a field crop competition in White Oats and Fall Wheat. An entry fee of 50c will be charged on each entry. All prize winners must exhibit a sheaf of grain at the local fair. All persons wishing to compete will send in their entries to R. W. McKellar, Glencoe, not later than May 15th.

## OIL IN ADELAIDE

Another oil well has been struck by the Adelaide Oil Company on the farm of George Glenn, main road, Adelaide township. A test pump was started and it is expected the well will pump about 15 barrels a day. This is the third well sunk on the Glenn farm. The first was a five-barrel well and was not pumped. A second was drilled to the west, but was dry.

## WAS ORGANIST FOR 38 YEARS

Mrs. L. J. Hummel has acted as regular organist in the Methodist church, Ridgetown, for the last time. Mrs. Hummel, tendered her resignation some months ago, but has continued to act until a successor could be found. The pastor on Sunday commented on the fact that for 38 years Mrs. Hummel had been the faithful organist and expressed the regret of the congregation at her retirement.

## BIBLE IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Rev. Canon Sage of London will introduce at the Anglican Synod in Brantford a resolution from the East Middlesex Deanery strongly advocating the employment of the Bible as a text book in the public schools. The suggestion will be forwarded to all of the Protestant churches of London in an effort to have a movement launched to bring pressure to bear upon the Provincial Department of Education.

## MOSA COUNCIL

A meeting of the Mosa council was held at Newbury on April 17. Members all present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The engineer's report on the Lethbridge drain was read and considered and laid over for further consideration on May 24th at 3 o'clock in the town hall, Glencoe.

A petition signed by Archie Purcell and others was presented to the council requesting that a by-law be passed to detach the north half of lot 9 in the 8th concession, owned by Archie Purcell, from school section No. 8, and add the same to school section No. 12. The petition was accepted by the council and the clerk was instructed to prepare a by-law to be brought before the council for passing on the 29th of May at one o'clock in the afternoon at Glencoe.

The clerk was instructed to notify George Loughheed to replace the fence along the Armstrong drain on the 3rd concession, opposite lot 17, in as good condition as before removed by him.

A by-law was passed increasing the clerk's salary \$120.

The council adjourned to meet as a court of revision on the assessment roll for 1920 at Glencoe town hall on May 29 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.
