

# WATERLOO NEWS RECORD OVER 32 MILLION GALLONS PUMPED DURING MAY

### While Three Shift System Has Been Installed Commission Anticipates No Change in Rates

The regular monthly meeting of the Water and Light Commission was held yesterday afternoon, all the members being present except Mr. A. E. Sanderson.

The business transacted was principally routine. During the month of May the record for the consumption of water was reached, due to the fact that the City of Kitchener received 21,322,500 gallons.

Manager Schiedel presented a good report on the Waterworks Convention held in Buffalo recently which appears as follows:

The following is the report in detail:

**Report for May, 1919**

**WATER DEPT.**

Total water pumped in May 32,080,000 gallons. An increase over April of 6,240,000 gals. or an average daily pumping of 1,034,839 gallons.

Highest number of gallons pumped in a day 1,280,000 gals.

Lowest number of gallons pumped in a day 400,000 gals.

Water pressure varied from 65 lbs. to 115 lbs.

Turbine pump was operated 545 hrs. 15 minutes, or an average of 7.32 hrs. per day.

Triple pump was operated 14 hrs. 15 minutes.

Current consumed for pumping 8,360 K.W.

Gallons pumped per kilowatt 549.7.

No. 1 Boiler was under steam 624 hrs. with an average steam pressure 18 lbs.

Coal consumed during May 14,235 tons, or an average of 459 lbs. per day.

Fire alarm May 11th at 10.30 p.m. from box 42, water pressure 85 lbs.

Kitchener got 21,322,500 gallons of water during the month of May.

I attended the Annual Convention of the American Waterworks Association in Buffalo last week and submit a separate report of this.

**ELEC. DEPT.**

This department is running very satisfactorily except a little difficulty in the pressure now and then, this however was overcome as soon as we learned what the trouble was.

We got five new gas tanks since our last meeting.

If this continues and we get a few more takers, provision will have to be made to install more transformers to increase our supply and this may necessitate an addition to the building.

Graphic meter min. peak was 1045 h.p. on May 16th.


Street lights were burning a total of 263 hrs. 30 min., or an average of 8 1/2 hrs. per night.

that we will be able to pull through without having to increase our rates.

I will give an illustration as to the rates in the City of Omaha, their scale was from 4 to 35 cents, which is from 6 to 22), they have increased their low rate to 8 cents for manufacturer and are reducing their high rate to domestic consumers.

Our reason that the Waterloo plant has been so successful is that practically every service is metered and only a small percentage are on flat rate, being one tap for kitchen and houses on the outskirts of the town who have no sewer connection.

Another point that was discussed was the housing problem, whether the question of providing water for large, this however pertained more to large companies in providing quarters for their workmen than for private residences.

The Buffalo Waterworks has a pumping capacity of 350 million gallons daily, the power used is steam, and the coal or slack is carried to the boilers by an arrangement of automatic stokers that feed the coal to the boilers and carries the ash out at the back, the time for one revolution taking 2 1/2 hours.

Referring again to meters the delegate from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, reported that they have every service metered in parking, drinking fountains, water in troughs, also services where the sprinkling carts get the water.

Another feature referred to was the air lift instead of pumping, this is being successfully used in various plants including our own town, and also in training camps in the United States as described by some of the delegates, who are connected with the army.

Owing to the demand for iron and steel for war purposes, wooden pipes have been used instead of iron, the California Redwood being preferable to Fir.

One paper dealing with the island of Hawaii, regarding their water supply, brought out the fact that the growth of vegetation is enormous, but the island has neither rats, mice, flies or mosquitoes.

The City of Buffalo has a great many parks where thousands of people take advantage of spending their spare time during the hot weather. Besides there is a large wading pool for the small children, in addition there are facilities for bathing.

As usual the manufacturers had a committee of ladies to provide entertainment for the visiting ladies, including Mrs. Schiedel, who accompanied for and they looked after them from time they reached Buffalo until they left, and all report having had an enjoyable trip.

From what I could learn, I find that there are quite a number and some of greater size than Waterloo are charging more for hydrant rental than we are here, while there are a few who are lower, but these realize that under present conditions they will have to increase in this respect very soon.

To give you an idea as to increase in price of hydrants alone the prices now are 150 per cent. higher than three years ago, the same applies to water pipes and other material used in this line.

Another reason for increases in water rates is due to having had to change in operating the plants from a two shift to a three or an additional engineer, this not only applies to Waterloo but to a great many other places.
