Canada and the deeds of her valiant
fighting men have been conspicuous in
Old London during the past fortnight,
owing to the opening of the two great
Canadiana exhibitions—the Canadian
War Memorials—and the Canadian
Official War Photographs—both of
which are attracting numbers of ad-
miring visitors. At Burlington House,
Piccadilly, better known as the Royal
Academy, the famous building is now
ruled by Canada, and the pictured story
of what a great and loyal Dominion
did in the war attracts large numbers.
These pictures were painted on the
spot by some of the most noted artists
of the day who were sent to the fight-
ing front at a period of the war when
the issue was still in the balance.
War in the air, on sea, and on land,
and war activity both at home and
abroad are pictured in varying scenes
by artists whose peculiar fitness for
each task has been carefully taken into
account. A notable picture is the
"Landing of the 1st Canadian Con-
tingent at St. Nazaire, February, 1915".
The portrait of Lady Drummond by our
own Florence Carlyle is one of outstand-
ing interest because of Lady Drum-
mond's Red Cross work and that of the
Maple Leaf Clubs which she started.
"The Night Patrol—Canadian M.L.
Boats entering Dover"—the M.L. boats
being those that took off the crew of the
gallant "Vindictive". The War Pho-
tographs at the Grafton Galleries cover
the period from Amiens to the Rhine.
They are beautiful pictures and they
touch upon every side of the Canadian
soldiers life from the gay scenes of the
corps sports, the pictures of the triumph
of the Canadians as they entered Den-
ain, Cambrai and Mons and those such
as that fine "The Last Salute".
Through the efforts of the National
Chapter Daughters of the Empire the
school children of Canada will have an
opportunity of seeing the most impor-
tant of these pictures in their own
schools, the Imperial Order having
obtained the right to reproduce re-
productions made for the purpose of provid-
ing our youth and future generations with
the pictured stories of the noble deeds
of Canada's gallant sons.

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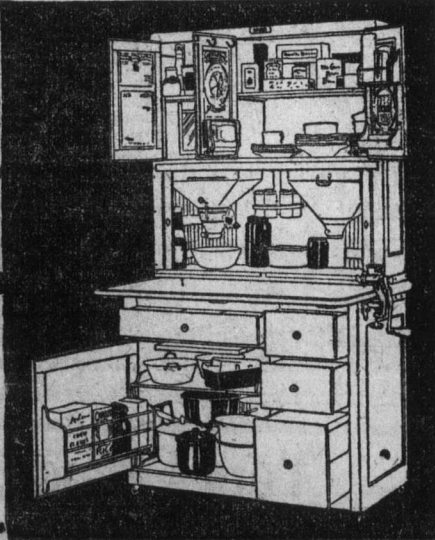
