currency per ounce, up to six ounces in weight: and three-pence for each additional ounce, up to sixteen ounces in weight, beyond which weight no printed book, publication or pamphlet shall be transmitted by post: always, that the Lieutenant Governor in Council may, by orders, alter, modify and reduce the rates of postage on such printed books, periodical publications or pamphlets as may be deemed fit and necessary.

Lt. Governor, &c., may alter and modify such rates.

XI. And be it enacted, That all moneys received on account of packet postage, to and from the United Kingdom, be carried to a senaquarterly into rate account by the Postmaster General of this Island, and paid by him, at the end of every quarter, into the Treasury of this Island; and the same shall be remitted by the Lieutenant Governor, not less than once every year, to the Postmaster General in England; and that all other moneys received by the Postmaster General of this Island shall be paid by him also, at the end of every such quarter, into the Treasury of this Island; and he shall also return to the Office of the Colonial Secretary, at the end of every such quarter, a quarterly account of the revenue received by him as aforesaid—the same to be laid before the Lieutenant Govarnor and Council.
