Impatient motorists are endangering the lives of teenagers on Dixie rd. between Burnhamthorpe and Base Line, ward 3 councillor Caye Killaby charged Monday.

Mrs. Killaby told council she had been approached by several people in the area asking if council can intervene to prevent what could result in a serious accident.

She said the problem arose during evening rush-hour traffic when

the teens got off school buses and either waited on the shoulder of the road to cross or stood chatting.

Mrs. Killaby said "in the last couple of weeks two teenagers have nearly been hit."

She said the "impatient" drivers, rather than waiting behind the school bus when its red lights were flashing, took to the shoulder of the road to pass.

Mayor Robert Speck

said it was an illegal act to drive on the shoulder of the road to pass a bus and instructed town police and traffic safety division to look into the matter.

Malton resident smiles and greets passing pilots

The Department of Transport is ignoring human rights, according to Allan Craig of Sledman st., Malton, and he's going to appeal his assessment tax again and again.

Mr. Craig lost the last round at Mississauga Court of Revision last week but he made it clear at a

public meeting of airport protestors at Malton last week that he is not giving up.

"I'm going to carry on doing it," he told about 150 people in Westwood Secondary School.

"I'll take it to the county judge because the Department of Transport is ignoring

the human rights of people."

He said Malton would end up in a similar situation to Chicago and Kennedy Airport, New York where the airports were "boxed in" with built-up areas.

Mr. Craig pointed out that about five years ago Cattrick residents successfully appealed their assessment taxes and achieved reductions.

He said he was told his assessment levy had been chopped by five percent to compensate for the aircraft noise over his home, although he couldn't see where it had been taken off his bill.

Anderson says 66-foot lots should not be cut

set by the provincial legislature on the basis of traffic and underground facilities.

"I am personally of the opinion," the Mississauga chief engineer continued, "that 66 feet is a minimum and could be reduced only at the sacrifice of services. I'd rather see a reduction setback or a 50-ft. right-of-way with 10-ft. easements on each side."

George Muirhead, director of planning for Etobicoke, challenged the builders to produce a good-looking subdivision on narrow lots. "The feeling is that it's going to reduce property value if the lots get smaller," he said. "And people are emotional about property values."

'S no land for Credit snowland

"S-no-land for snowmobiles close to Port Credit and the local followers of that winter sport wrote a letter complaining about it to Port Credit Council.

The open letter was read in council Tuesday, Dec. 3, and Councilman Ed Donner and Reeve David Hunter, themselves snowmobilers, supported the complaint.

"People who live in Port Credit and drive snowmobiles have to travel miles to find land

where they can use their machines," said Mr. Donner.

"I think that with all the park land around here, at least some of it could be opened up to the use of the machines," Mr. Hunter suggested.

Council agreed and is drafting a letter to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority recommending that the authority open portions of its parks to the use of snowmobiles.
