Ottawa, 22nd. November, 1915.

Rev. Sirs-

I am in receipt of your letter of the 17th instant with enclosure, relative to the case of Christina Sampson an ex-pupil of the Elkhorn Industrial School, and in reply I beg to say that on the 24th April, last, Mr. Wilson, Principal of the school, informed the Department that arrangements had been made by Inspector Jackson to have this girl enter into the services of a Mrs. O. H. Clark, who had agreed to pay a salary of \$15.00 a month to the girl. Mr. Wilson stated that he expected that Inspector Jackson would call at the school, about the first of May last and take the girl with him to Mrs. Clark's. It is not understood why this arrangement was not carried into effect. The Department desires that you will at once communicate with Inspector Jackson, and if possible arrange to have the girl go to Mrs. Clark without any delay. If Mrs. Clark no longer desires the girl's services you should endeavour to make arrangements immediately for her to enter service in a respectable home on a farm or in some small town.

You may incur an expenditure of \$20.00 in the purchase of warm clothing for Christina. It is thought that she should remain at her grandfather's house until
