victory has been a large one. Our production has not been restricted to the needs of Canadian soldiers, sailors and airmen. We have produced to the limit of our capacity to supply the fighting men of other allied nations. And we have taken steps to make sure that the arms and munitions are sent where they are most needed. That is what we mean by mutual aid.

battles on nearly every front, the soldiers, sailors and airmen of the United Nations were just as brave as they are today. Today the allied forces are winning battles, because they have the armour: the guns and tanks and ships and planes. We have kept the fighting away from our own shores, because hundreds of thousands of young Canadians were ready to risk their lives to defeat the enemy on the other side of the seas. They have been able to take the splendid part they have because the people at home were willing to work harder and to contribute of their means in taxes and loans, in order to provide the implements of war.
