The exit of the little company that formed the nucleus of what Dr. Hutch styled "perhaps the most successful mission ever undertaken by Mrs. Ball's daughters," though not first in point of time of departure from the Mother House, is of first importance in this narrative, and was brought about in no extraordinary way.
