TWO DIE BY GAS.

One Case of Suicide; Other May Have Been an Accident.

Toronto, March 22.—When the room of George Grier at 118 D'Aray street, was entered yesterday morning by Mrs. Gallagher, the landlady, he was found lying dead on the bed. He had not undressed. The gas was turned on, and the stovepipe hole and door cracks were plugged. Deceased was 60 years of age. At one time he was employed by the Toronto General Trust Co. Lately he has been an agent for the Royal Insurance Co. He leaves a wife, son and daughter.

At the age of 70 Thomas Reid, a well-known character, who has hung around St. Lawrence Market, was found dead in a room in the Imperial Hotel at 52 Jarvis street. The gas was on full. He had not been noticed around since Monday night.
