\$2,000 MORE

Phil. H. Bowyer, M. P. F., Secures a Second Grant Towards Rond Eau Park

Supplementary estimates brought down in the Provincial Legislature on Friday contained an additional \$2,000 for work on Rond Eau Park. This amount will be devoted towards "lumbering." It is the intention to remove the mature timber in the forest, making room for the younger trees. The forest will in future be managed on principles making for its preservation. The trees taken down will be cut into lumber, some of which will be used in the construction of a new wharf and in other necessary improvements. The balance will be sold, also the cordwood. The revenue derived from these operations will all be spent in improving the park.

WINK EYE

SUDDEN STROKE

Robert Riddell, one of Chatham's oldest machinists, was taken suddenly ill with heart trouble this morning about two o'clock.

Mr. Riddell was feeling quite well when he retired but he is now in a very critical condition. His throat has become paralysed so that he cannot speak and his brain is also affected. He has only spoken a couple of words since he was taken ill and he has no use whatever of his left side.

Mr. Riddell rallied a little during the night and was somewhat better this morning, but he was taken worse again at noon to-day and now does not recognize anyone and seems to be gradually sinking. His many friends will be sorry to hear of his dangerous illness.

OLD RESIDENT GONE

Thomas Frawley, one of the oldest pioneers of the county, passed away yesterday at his home in this city. Deceased was 75 years of age and has lived in Kent County all of his life. Three daughters and one son are left to mourn his loss.

The funeral will take place to-day at two o'clock from John's morgan to the C. E. depot. The remains will be taken to Dundas for burial.

Deceased at one time was a popular hotel keeper in Chatham, having kept two houses, one on the market and the other where the Courtney House now stands.

Who Threw Him Over Fence.

London, May 26.—A somewhat lively scene occurred in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon when Charles Devlin asked the names of the constables who threw Higgins, J. P., over a stone wall at Carrowkeek on April 26. Secretary Lord asked Higgins was not thrown over the wall. Devlin retorted, midst Nationalist cheers, that he had seen the deed done and it was a brutal exhibition. Long replied he had reason to believe his information was correct.

Dr. Kilpatrick for Knox.

Toronto, May 26.—Dr. Kilpatrick, Manitoba College, has accepted the chair of systematic theology in Knox College. Dr. Kilpatrick is at present in Scotland, and his acceptance was in answer to a cablegram from the moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church.

Carried Over the Falls.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., May 26.—The bodies of all three of the men who were swept over the Horseshoe Falls in a boat on the night of April 23 have been found in the lower river. They are supposed to have been caught in an ice floe while fishing and carried over the falls.

Station Collapse; 4 Men May Die.

Vancouver, B. C., May 26.—The Canadian Pacific Railroad station at Cranbrook collapsed while undergoing repairs and eleven men were injured. Four of the injured may die, and five others are severely hurt.

Postal Rates Barred.

London, May 26.—It is officially announced that the Postmaster-General has no intention of submitting to the Colonial conference the question of postal rates and the Canadian Empire cables.
