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HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

THE HABIT OF NAGGING.—It is easy to get into the habit of nagging and fretting. Watch any ordinary coming together of people, and see how many minutes it will be before somebody frets—that is, makes more or less complaining statements of some things or other, which most probably every one in the room, or on the stage or the car or on the street corner, as it may be, knew before, and which probably nobody can help. Why say anything about it? There are always plenty of things to fret about. It is simply astonishing how many annoyances and how much discomfort may be found in the course of a day. If one only keeps a sharp eye out on that side of things, we are born to trouble as the sparks fly upward. But even far sparks flying upward in the blackness of smoke there is the blue sky above, and the less time they waste on the road, the sooner they will reach it. Fretting is all time wasted on the road.

over, thoroughly washed and then thrown into briskly-boiled salted water and kept boiling for twenty-five minutes, then drained through a colander and set in the oven for a few minutes until thoroughly dry, when it may be sent to the table in an uncovered dish. It is very nutritious when served with meat or poultry, and much more digestible than the potato.

Creng for coffee may be manufactured and the former seldom detected by heating the milk of an egg with one tablespoonful of cold water, heating the milk and pouring over the egg, stirring constantly when the boiling hot coffee is added. There is much art in the successful cooking of a potato, and the art begins in the soaking. It spoils the flavor of peeled potatoes to leave them in water for an hour or so before they are to be boiled. They should only remain in water for a few minutes before they are put into the pot. Steamed potatoes are always more appetizing than boiled ones. Potatoes should never be covered when ready to be dished, but the uncovered pot containing them may be set, to keep hot, on the back of the stove.

A cooking teacher advises that lean fish like halibut, cod and others of that character may be brushed with oil or melted butter and broiled on the gas broiler. This way of cooking, it is asserted, is similar to drying and does not fill the house with the smell of fried fish.

When opening a bottle of olives remember that any you are not using at once should be replaced in the liquor in the bottle and tightly corked again as quickly as possible, by any chance the liquor has been thrown away, put them in a strong solution of salt and water and tightly cork.

Treat is with good reason considered an invalid's food, for the process of toasting turns part of the starch of the bread into dextrine which is digested with great ease. Bread for toast must be cut thin and dried out at a little distance from the fire, then brought nearer and browned. You may dry them as in a dry
