Gloomy Outlook Still At Twillingate

As Far as Fishery is Concerned—Mining Matters

Twillingate, July 22.—We are sorry to still have to report that nothing has been done with the cod since last report. Up to the present things are looking rather gloomy as far as the fishery outlook is concerned, and the nearby settlements are pretty much the same as ourselves, nothing doing.

The S.S. Sagona arrived here on Sunday afternoon. She brought a very small lot of reight for this place only a package or two. Two American gentlemen, who are greatly interested in mines, took passage by the Sagona for Fleur de Lys. Mr. James Hodder went along with them to show them the mine he has there. The sample of copper ore showed them was of such a good quality that they were induced to go and see for themselves.

Three of the party who were interested in the mine at Sleepy Cove left here at 4 p.m. by motor boat for Lewisport to connect with the train for St. John's, where they will remain for a week or more. They were exceedingly pleased with their trip north, and we hope that their short stay at the capital will also be enjoyable.

The schooner Willie R., Capt. Kennedy, is now loading herring at Ashbourne's.

The schooner Maggie Sullivan arrived here last evening from St. John's with supplies for J. W. Hodge.

Mr. Horwood, in the motor boat Swan, arrived here from Horwood at 12 o'clock, on his way to Campbellton. All our Union friends are anxiously waiting to see the motor boat 'F.P.U.' make here appearance. Friend Loyte hearing that the President was at Change Islands brought up a flag staff for the Union Hall, so that a flag may be hoisted on it on the arrival of the President.

Mr. Templeton, Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, who was away on his vacation, returned by the Clyde on Sunday.

The Prospero, Sagona and Fogota bring most discouraging news of the northern fishery.

From White Bay to Cape Bonavista very little is doing, but south of that there is a fair sign.

REQUIEM MASS FOR JOHN PEDDLE

Requiem mass was said at the cathedral on Tuesday morning for the repose of the soul of John Peddle, who was killed at Britannia mines recently. Deceased was a member of New Westminster Council. The body has been shipped to his home in St. John's, Newfoundland.

The pall-bearers were Grand Knight Keary, Past Grand Knight McDonald, Deputy Grand Knight McIsaacs, and Brothers Gavin, Gregory, and O'Connor. Brother Morse, Tacoma Council, sent an offering from the Catholic men at the mine.

To-day (Friday) a solemn requiem mass will be sung in St. Peter's church, New Westminster, by Fr. Beck, for the repose of the soul of Bro. Peddle, who was a late parishioner of St. Peter's church, and also a member of the local Knight's Council.

Bro. Peddle was a young man and unmarried. R.I.P.—"Western Catholic."

The funeral took place in St. John's on Friday afternoon and was attended by a large number of friends. The service at the cathedral was conducted by Rev. Dr. Greene. Interment was at Mt. Carmel.

Mrs. M. C. Brady, who accompanied the remains of the late Mr. Peddle from Vancouver, left for home by last evening's express, being accompanied as far as Kelligrews, by Mr. Peddle, of the N. S. She has travelled extensively in all parts of America. Her husband is chief embalmer with the undertaking establishment that had charge of the remains of the late Mr. Peddle.
