ELBE MILLS.
MONDAY, Feb. 3.—Rev. Mr. Wilson is holding revival meetings here and there are already several converts. At Friday evenings and Sabbath afternoon service the school house was crowded.
Mrs. Jan. Weaver, Miss Lizzie and Ena Leith, and R. Cornell and family are the latest sufferers from the gripe in this place. All are recovering, however, and are able to be around.

DELTA FAIR.
The first meeting of the South Leeds Agricultural Society will be held at Delta on Saturday, 8th inst. The directors have expressed a determination to make the fair of 1890 excel all previously held, and a glance at the personnel of the board will be sufficient to convince any one that they will accomplish all that they undertake. The directorate is composed of good energetic farmers and business men and are among the best of the county. Messrs. B. G. Murphy and John Bower are extensive farmers, thoroughly alive to the benefits conferred by a good live agricultural society and can be depended upon to do their share.
Last fall Delta fair was favoured with exceptionally fine weather, and consequently is in a much better financial position to prepare for an extra good exhibition next fall than the majority of the societies in the county. The meeting on Saturday next should be well attended, as it will be one of the most important of the year.

SATURDAY, Feb. 1.—The new saw mill and wooden ware factory is progressing rapidly. The roof on, debris removed, floor laid, and a portion of the Eyrre line of R. R. graded. The removal of the old frame dry house has added much to the appearance of lower town. Logs are coming in and everything is lively when a short time ago all was ruin and desolation. On Friday last, the Rev. J. J. Wright was inducted as pastor of the Presbyterian congregation of Lyn, Caintown and Mallorytown. In spite of the unfavorable weather, there was a large attendance both in the afternoon and at the reception in the evening. W. M. Caswell, formerly a resident, now of Grand Forks, Dakota, paid a visit last week to the scenes of his boyhood. Although absent for over 17 years, time has dealt kindly with him; he is very little changed in appearance.
Death has been at work again in our midst. The lady who was the mother of the little daughter of Mr. Bryson and Miss Adda Booth, who died at her sister's home in Montreal. The gripe is still getting in its work. Every few days we hear of fresh victims.

A Newborn Case.
At the division court held in Newboro on the 23rd Jan., a case of peculiar interest was heard before His Honor Judge Reynolds. The case, briefly stated, was this: Richard Blake, a former well known resident of Newboro, sued the corporation of the village for \$12.50 over charge on assessment. From the evidence it appeared that in the spring of 1889 the assessor called at Mr. Blake's residence and made out his assessment slip, putting him down thereon besides his real estate, for \$600 income, sometime after, Mr. Blake called at the clerk's office and found that some person had put his income on the assessment roll at \$1,500. He had never been served with a notice of the change in the assessment, and it came out in evidence that the assessor had made out the revised slip but that it had never been delivered to Blake. When the collector called for taxes, Blake refused to pay except on the basis of his first and only legal assessment. The collector seized some of Blake's property, whereupon the whole amount claimed was paid in under protest. For the defence it was claimed that the court had no jurisdiction, and that by Blake's examination of the assessment roll he had plenty of opportunity to appeal to the Court of Revision. His Honor reserved judgment until Saturday last, when he gave a verdict for Plaintiff (Blake) for the full amount claimed with costs. Mr. Hutchison, of Brockville, appeared for plaintiff and Mr. D. H. Cole, Newboro, for the defendant.

NEWBORO.
SATURDAY, Feb. 1.—With much regret we record the death of Mrs. John Driffin, who passed away on Monday, 27th Jan. For many years she had been a devout christian and an energetic worker for the Presbyterian cause, here. Her brothers, Geo. Bell, of the civil service, Ottawa, and Andrew Bell, of Carleton Place, were here to pay their last tribute of respect. She leaves one son and two daughters to mourn the loss of a kind and indulgent mother.
Mrs. Michael Morarty died on Monday last of inflammation. The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. Morarty in his bereavement.
A lodge of the A. O. U. W. which was established here a few weeks ago, promises ere long to be one of the strongest in the back townships. It has a membership of about 50 at present, besides a number of applications recently sent in.

But the claims of his new practice and the natural difficulties which the Dr. felt at receiving an address from his old friends, prevented its presentation until Monday evening when, taking advantage of a professional visit of the Dr. to this place, representatives of the lodges conveyed him into Lamb's hall where the presentation address was read by Rev. L. A. Betts. Accompanying the address was a valuable gold watch appropriately engraved. Dr. Cornell gratefully acknowledged the honor conferred.
